CALIFORNIA BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE

Dental Practice Act

Article 2.6. Continuing Education

1645-1645.1

BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 1645-1645.1

1645. (a) Effective with the 1974 license renewal period, if the board determines that the public health and safety would be served by requiring all holders of licenses under this chapter to continue their education after receiving a license, it may require, as a condition to the renewal thereof, that they submit assurances satisfactory to the board that they will, during the succeeding two-year period, inform themselves of the developments in the practice of dentistry occurring since the original issuance of their licenses by pursuing one or more courses of study satisfactory to the board or by other means deemed equivalent by the board.

The board shall adopt regulations providing for the suspension of the licenses at the end of the two-year period until compliance with the assurances provided for in this section is accomplished.

(b) The board may also, as a condition of license renewal, require licentiates to successfully complete a portion of the required continuing education hours in specific areas adopted in regulations by the board. The board may prescribe this mandatory coursework within the general areas of patient care, health and safety, and law and ethics. The mandatory coursework prescribed by the board shall not exceed fifteen hours per renewal period for dentists, and seven and one-half hours per renewal period for dental auxiliaries. Any mandatory coursework required by the board shall be credited toward the continuing education requirements established by the board pursuant to subdivision (a).

1645.1. (a) By January 1, 2006, a person who holds a registered dental assistant license shall provide evidence of having successfully completed board-approved courses in radiation safety and coronal polishing. The length and content of the courses shall be governed by applicable board regulations. Failure to comply with this section shall result in automatic suspension of the license, which shall be reinstated upon the receipt of evidence that the licensee has successfully completed the required courses. Completion of the courses may be counted toward fulfillment of the continuing

education requirements governed by Section 1645.

(b) The holder of an inactive registered dental assistant license is only required to comply with subdivision (a) as a condition of returning his or her license to active status.

Article 2.9. Dental Restorative Materials

1648.10-1648.20

BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 1648.10-1648.20

1648.10. (a) The Board of Dental Examiners of California shall develop and distribute a fact sheet describing and comparing the risks and efficacy of the various types of dental restorative materials that may be used to repair a dental patient's oral condition or defect. The fact sheet shall include:

- (1) A description of the groups of materials that are available to the profession for restoration of an oral condition or defect.
- (2) A comparison of the relative benefits and detriments of each group of materials.
- (3) A comparison of the cost considerations associated with each group of materials.
- (4) A reference to encourage discussion between patient and dentist regarding materials and to inform the patient of his or her options.
- (b) The fact sheet shall be made available by the Board of Dental Examiners of California to all licensed dentists.
- (c) The Board of Dental Examiners of California shall update the fact sheet described in subdivision (a) as determined necessary by the board.

1648.15. The fact sheet set forth by Section 1648.10 shall be provided by a dentist to every new patient and to patients of record prior to the performance of dental restoration work. The dentist needs to provide the fact sheet to each patient only once pursuant to the previous requirements of this section. An acknowledgment of the receipt of the fact sheet by the patient shall be signed by the patient and a copy of it shall be placed in the patient's dental record. If updates to the fact sheet are made by the board, the updated fact sheet shall be given to patients in the manner provided above. A dentist shall also provide the fact sheet to the patient upon request.

1648.20. (a) This article shall not apply to any surgical, endodontic, periodontic, or orthodontic dental procedure in which dental restorative materials are not used.

(b) For purposes of this article, "dental restorative materials"

means any structure or device placed into a patient's mouth with the intent that it remain there for an indefinite period beyond the completion of the dental procedure, including material used for filling cavities in, or rebuilding or repairing the organic structure of, a tooth or teeth, but excluding synthesized structures or devices intended to wholly replace an extracted tooth or teeth, such as implants.

Article 3. Registration

1650-1657

BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 1650-1657

1650. Every person who is now or hereafter licensed to practice dentistry in this state shall register on forms prescribed by the board, his or her place of practice with the Executive Officer of the State Board of Dental Examiners, or, if he or she has more than one place of practice, all of the places of practice, or, if he or she has no place of practice, to so notify the executive officer of the board. A person licensed by the board shall register with the executive officer within 30 days after the date of his or her license.

1651. Any dentist who removes his place of practice shall register each change made by him within one month after making said change. In the event any licensed dentist fails to notify the board of any change in the address of his place of practice within the time prescribed by this section, the board shall not renew such person's license until the penalty fixed by this chapter is paid. An applicant for renewal of a license to practice dentistry shall specify in his application whether he has changed the address of his place of practice, and if so, the date of such change, and the board may accept such statement as evidence of such fact.

1653. The secretary shall issue a certificate of registration for each licentiate hereunder and for each office registered by such licentiate. The license and certificate may be offered as primary evidence in all courts of the facts therein stated.

1654. Any licensed person who shall change his or her name according to law shall, within 10 days after that change, reregister with the executive officer of the board and the executive officer shall make a marginal note of the former name of the licentiate.

1655. Any failure on the part of any person holding such license to register it as directed for a period of six months after its issuance shall ipso facto work a forfeiture of his license, and it shall not be restored except upon the written application and payment to the board of the fee provided for restoration of license.

- 1656. On and after January 1, 1985, every dentist licensed to practice dentistry in the state and any person working in a dentist's office who operates dental radiographic equipment shall meet at least one of the following requirements:
- (a) Pass a course, approved by the board, in radiation safety which includes theory and clinical application in radiographic technique. The board shall require the courses to be taught by persons qualified in radiographic technique and shall adopt regulations specifying the qualifications for course instructors.
- (b) Have passed a radiation safety examination conducted by the board prior to January 1, 1985.
- 1657. (a) A licensed dentist may operate one mobile dental clinic or unit registered as a dental office or facility. The mobile dental clinic or unit shall be registered and operated in accordance with regulations established by the board, provided these regulations are not designed to prevent or lessen competition in service areas. A mobile dental clinic or unit registered and operated in accordance with the board's regulations and that has paid the fees established by the board, including a mobile dental unit registered for the purpose specified in subdivision (d), shall otherwise be exempted from this article and Article 3.5 (commencing with Section 1658).
- (b) A mobile service unit, as defined in subdivision (b) of Section 1765.105 of the Health and Safety Code, and a mobile unit operated by an entity that is exempt from licensure pursuant to subdivision (b), (c), or (h) of Section 1206 of the Health and Safety Code, are exempt from this article and Article 3.5 (commencing with Section 1658). Notwithstanding this exemption, the owner or operator of the mobile unit shall notify the board within 60 days of the date on which dental services are first delivered in the mobile unit, or the date on which the mobile unit's application pursuant to Section 1765.130 of the Health and Safety Code is approved, whichever is earlier.
- (c) A licensee practicing in a mobile unit described in subdivision (b) is not subject to subdivision (a) as to that mobile unit.
- (d) Notwithstanding Section 1625, a licensed dentist shall be permitted to operate a mobile dental unit provided by his or her property and casualty insurer as a temporary substitute site for the practice registered by him or her pursuant to Section 1650 as long as both of the following apply:
- (1) The licensed dentist's registered place of practice has been rendered and remains unusable due to loss or calamity.
 - (2) The licensee's insurer registers the unit with the board in

Article 3.5 Additional Offices

1658-1658.8

BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 1658-1658.8

1658. (a) When a licensee desires to have more than one place of practice, he or she shall, prior to the opening of the additional office, apply to the board, pay the fee required by this chapter, and receive permission in writing from the board to have the additional place of practice.

"Place of practice" means any dental office where any act of dentistry is practiced as defined by Section 1625, and includes a place of practice in which the applicant holds any proprietary interest of any nature whatsoever, or in which he or she holds any right to participate in the management or control thereof. A dentist who is the lessor of a dental office shall not be deemed to hold a proprietary interest in that place of practice, unless he or she is entitled to participate in the management or control of the dentistry practiced there.

- (b) This section shall not apply to a licensee who practices dentistry outside his or her registered place of practice in any of the following places:
- (1) Facilities licensed by the State Department of Health Services.
- (2) Licensed health facilities as defined in Section 1250 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (3) Clinics that are licensed under subdivision (a) of Section 1204 of, or that are exempt from licensure under subdivision (b), (c), or (h) of Section 1206 of, the Health and Safety Code.
- (4) Licensed community care facilities as defined in Section 1502 of the Health and Safety Code.
 - (5) Schools of any grade level, whether public or private.
- (6) Public institutions, including, but not limited to, federal, state, and local penal and correctional facilities.
- (7) Mobile units that are operated by a public or governmental agency or a nonprofit or charitable organization and are approved by the board, provided that the mobile units meet all statutory or regulatory requirements.
- (8) The home of a nonambulatory patient when a physician or registered nurse has provided a written note that the patient is unable to visit a dental office.
- 1658.1. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit a licensed dentist from maintaining more than one dental office in this state if all of the following conditions are met:
- (a) In addition to any existing legal responsibility or liability, a dentist maintaining more than one office shall assume legal responsibility and liability for the dental services rendered in each of the offices maintained by the dentist.

- (b) A dentist maintaining more than one office shall ensure that each office is in compliance with the supervision requirements of this chapter.
- (c) A dentist maintaining more than one office shall post, in an area which is likely to be seen by all patients who use the facility, a sign with the dentist's name, mailing address, telephone number, and dental license number.
- 1658.2. (a) "Additional place of practice," as used in this article, means any place of practice that increases the number of places of practice of the applicant, and includes an additional office that the applicant proposes to originally establish, either individually or in association with another, as well as an established place of practice that the applicant acquires or proposes to acquire, in whole or in part, by purchase, repossession, reassignment, gift, devise, bequest, or operation of law, except as otherwise provided in this article.
- (b) A practice location described in subdivision (b) of Section 1658 does not constitute an additional place of practice.
- 1658.3. Nothing in this article shall limit or authorize the board to limit the number of additional places of practice authorized by the board, which are in operation on October 1, 1961, and which conform to the provisions of this article, nor prevent or limit a licensee from acquiring from his parent, by sale, transfer, assignment, gift, succession, bequest, or operation of law, whether heretofore or hereafter made, prior to January 1, 1968 or the effective date of the amendments to this section enacted by the Legislature at the 1967 Regular Session, whichever date occurs later, and from operating any additional office or offices of his parent so acquired.
- 1658.4. The transfer after October 1, 1961, of any additional office from one licentiate to another, other than as authorized by this article, shall terminate the privilege of operating such additional office.
- 1658.5. The transfer of the location of one additional office to a new location within the same county shall not be considered the establishment of a new additional office.
- 1658.6. Failure to comply with the provisions of this article relating to the operation of additional offices shall be a ground for the suspension or revocation of the permission granted by the board to operate such additional office.
- 1658.7. The board shall have the power to carry out the provisions of this article by uniform rules and regulations.

1658.8. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a licensed dentist may operate a mobile dental unit provided by his or her property and casualty insurer as a temporary substitute site for the practice registered by him or her pursuant to Section 1650, if both of the following requirements are met:

- (a) The licensee's registered place of practice has been rendered and remains unusable due to loss or calamity.
- (b) The licensee's insurer registers the unit with the board in compliance with Section 1657.

Article 4. Suspension and Revocation of Licenses

1670-1686

BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS CODE SECTION 1670-1686

1670. Any licentiate may have his license revoked or suspended or be reprimanded or be placed on probation by the board for unprofessional conduct, or incompetence, or gross negligence, or repeated acts of negligence in his or her profession, or for the issuance of a license by mistake, or for any other cause applicable to the licentiate provided in this chapter. The proceedings under this article shall be conducted in accordance with Chapter 5 (commencing with Section 11500) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, and the board shall have all the powers granted therein.

1670.1. Any licentiate under this chapter may have his or her license revoked or suspended or be reprimanded or be placed on probation by the board for conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of a dentist or dental auxiliary, in which case the record of conviction or a certified copy thereof, certified by the clerk of the court or by the judge in whose court the conviction is had, shall be conclusive evidence.

The board shall undertake proceedings under this section upon the receipt of a certified copy of the record of conviction. A plea or verdict of guilty or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere made to a charge of a felony or of any misdemeanor substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of a dentist or dental auxiliary is deemed to be a conviction within the meaning of this section. The board may order the license suspended or revoked, or may decline to issue a license, when the time for appeal has elapsed, or the judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal or when an order granting probation is made suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under any provision of the Penal Code, including, but not limited to, Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code, allowing such person to withdraw his or her plea of guilty and to enter a plea of not guilty, or setting aside the

verdict of guilty, or dismissing the accusation, information or indictment.

- 1670.2. (a) Except as otherwise provided in this section, any proceeding initiated by the board against a licensee for the violation of any provision of this chapter shall be filed within three years after the board discovers the act or omission alleged as the ground for disciplinary action, or within seven years after the act or omission alleged as the ground for disciplinary action occurs, whichever occurs first.
- (b) An accusation filed against a licensee pursuant to Section 11503 of the Government Code alleging fraud or willful misrepresentation is not subject to the limitation in subdivision (a).
- (c) An accusation filed against a licensee pursuant to Section 11503 of the Government Code alleging unprofessional conduct based on incompetence, gross negligence, or repeated negligent acts of the licensee is not subject to the limitation in subdivision (a) upon proof that the licensee intentionally concealed from discovery his or her incompetence, gross negligence, or repeated negligent acts.
- (d) If an alleged act or omission involves any conduct described in subdivision (e) of Section 1680 committed on a minor, the seven-year limitations period in subdivision (a) and the 10-year limitations period in subdivision (e) shall be tolled until the minor reaches the age of majority.
- (e) An accusation filed against a licensee pursuant to Section 11503 of the Government Code alleging conduct described in subdivision (e) of Section 1680 not committed on a minor shall be filed within three years after the board discovers the act or omission alleged as the ground for disciplinary action, or within 10 years after the act or omission alleged as the ground for disciplinary action occurs, whichever occurs first. This subdivision shall apply to a complaint alleging conduct received by the board on and after January 1, 2005.
- (f) In any allegation, accusation, or proceeding described in this section, the limitations period in subdivision (a) shall be tolled for the period during which material evidence necessary for prosecuting or determining whether a disciplinary action would be appropriate is unavailable to the board due to an ongoing criminal investigation.
- 1671. The board may discipline a licentiate by placing him or her on probation under various terms and conditions, which may include, but are not limited to, the following:
- (a) Requiring the licentiate to obtain additional training or pass an examination upon completion of training, or both. The examination may be written, oral, or both, and may be a practical or clinical examination or both, at the option of the board.
- (b) Requiring the licentiate to submit to a complete diagnostic examination by one or more physicians appointed by the board, if warranted by the physical or mental condition of the licentiate. If the board requires the licentiate to submit to such an examination, the board shall receive and consider any other report of a complete diagnostic examination given by one or more physicians of the licentiate's choice.
 - (c) Restricting or limiting the extent, scope or type of practice

of the licentiate.

- (d) Requiring restitution of fees to the licentiate's patients or payers of services unless such restitution has already been made.
- (e) Providing the option of alternative community service in lieu of all or part of a period of suspension in cases other than violations relating to quality of care.
- 1678. Upon the revocation of any license, the fact shall be noted upon the records of the board and the license shall be marked as canceled upon the date of its revocation.
- 1680. Unprofessional conduct by a person licensed under this chapter is defined as, but is not limited to, any one of the following:
 - (a) The obtaining of any fee by fraud or misrepresentation.
- (b) The employment directly or indirectly of any student or suspended or unlicensed dentist to practice dentistry as defined in this chapter.
- (c) The aiding or abetting of any unlicensed person to practice dentistry.
- (d) The aiding or abetting of a licensed person to practice dentistry unlawfully.
- (e) The committing of any act or acts of sexual abuse, misconduct, or relations with a patient that are substantially related to the practice of dentistry.
- (f) The use of any false, assumed, or fictitious name, either as an individual, firm, corporation, or otherwise, or any name other than the name under which he or she is licensed to practice, in advertising or in any other manner indicating that he or she is practicing or will practice dentistry, except that name as is specified in a valid permit issued pursuant to Section 1701.5.
- (g) The practice of accepting or receiving any commission or the rebating in any form or manner of fees for professional services, radiograms, prescriptions, or other services or articles supplied to patients.
- (h) The making use by the licensee or any agent of the licensee of any advertising statements of a character tending to deceive or mislead the public.
- (i) The advertising of either professional superiority or the advertising of performance of professional services in a superior manner. This subdivision shall not prohibit advertising permitted by subdivision (h) of Section 651.
 - (j) The employing or the making use of solicitors.
 - (k) The advertising in violation of Section 651.
- (1) The advertising to guarantee any dental service, or to perform any dental operation painlessly. This subdivision shall not prohibit advertising permitted by Section 651.
- (m) The violation of any of the provisions of law regulating the procurement, dispensing, or administration of dangerous drugs, as defined in Article 7 (commencing with Section 4211) of Chapter 9, or controlled substances, as defined in Division 10 (commencing with Section 11000) of the Health and Safety Code.
 - (n) The violation of any of the provisions of this division.
 - (o) The permitting of any person to operate dental radiographic

equipment who has not met the requirements of Section 1656.

(p) The clearly excessive prescribing or administering of drugs or treatment, or the clearly excessive use of diagnostic procedures, or the clearly excessive use of diagnostic or treatment facilities, as determined by the customary practice and standards of the dental profession.

Any person who violates this subdivision is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100) or more than six hundred dollars (\$600), or by imprisonment for a term of not less than 60 days or more than 180 days, or by both a fine and imprisonment.

- (q) The use of threats or harassment against any patient or licensee for providing evidence in any possible or actual disciplinary action, or other legal action; or the discharge of an employee primarily based on the employee's attempt to comply with the provisions of this chapter or to aid in the compliance.
- (r) Suspension or revocation of a license issued, or discipline imposed, by another state or territory on grounds which would be the basis of discipline in this state.
 - (s) The alteration of a patient's record with intent to deceive.
- (t) Unsanitary or unsafe office conditions, as determined by the customary practice and standards of the dental profession.
- (u) The abandonment of the patient by the licensee, without written notice to the patient that treatment is to be discontinued and before the patient has ample opportunity to secure the services of another dentist and provided the health of the patient is not jeopardized.
- (v) The willful misrepresentation of facts relating to a disciplinary action to the patients of a disciplined licensee.
- (w) Use of fraud in the procurement of any license issued pursuant to this chapter.
- (\mathbf{x}) Any action or conduct which would have warranted the denial of the license.
- (y) The aiding or abetting of a licensed dentist or dental auxiliary to practice dentistry in a negligent or incompetent manner.
- (z) The failure to report to the board in writing within seven days any of the following: (1) the death of his or her patient during the performance of any dental procedure; (2) the discovery of the death of a patient whose death is related to a dental procedure performed by him or her; or (3) except for a scheduled hospitalization, the removal to a hospital or emergency center for medical treatment for a period exceeding 24 hours of any patient to whom oral conscious sedation, conscious sedation, or general anesthesia was administered, or any patient as a result of dental treatment. With the exception of patients to whom oral conscious sedation, conscious sedation, or general anesthesia was administered, removal to a hospital or emergency center that is the normal or expected treatment for the underlying dental condition is not required to be reported. Upon receipt of a report pursuant to this subdivision the board may conduct an inspection of the dental office if the board finds that it is necessary.
- (aa) Participating in or operating any group advertising and referral services that are in violation of Section 650.2.
- (bb) The failure to use a fail-safe machine with an appropriate exhaust system in the administration of nitrous oxide. The board shall, by regulation, define what constitutes a fail-safe machine.
 - (cc) Engaging in the practice of dentistry with an expired

license.

(dd) Except for good cause, the knowing failure to protect patients by failing to follow infection control guidelines of the board, thereby risking transmission of blood-borne infectious diseases from dentist or dental auxiliary to patient, from patient to patient, and from patient to dentist or dental auxiliary. In administering this subdivision, the board shall consider referencing the standards, regulations, and guidelines of the State Department of ${\tt Health \ Services \ developed \ pursuant \ to \ Section \ 1250.11 \ of \ the \ Health}$ and Safety Code and the standards, quidelines, and regulations pursuant to the California Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1973 (Part 1 (commencing with Section 6300), Division 5, Labor Code) for preventing the transmission of HIV, hepatitis B, and other blood-borne pathogens in health care settings. As necessary, the board shall consult with the Medical Board of California, the Board of Podiatric Medicine, the Board of Registered Nursing, and the Board of Vocational Nursing and Psychiatric Technicians, to encourage appropriate consistency in the implementation of this subdivision.

The board shall seek to ensure that licensees and others regulated by the board are informed of the responsibility of licensees and others to follow infection control guidelines, and of the most recent scientifically recognized safeguards for minimizing the risk of transmission of blood-borne infectious diseases.

- (ee) The utilization by a licensed dentist of any person to perform the functions of a registered dental assistant, registered dental assistant in extended functions, registered dental hygienist, or registered dental hygienist in extended functions who, at the time of initial employment, does not possess a current, valid license to perform those functions.
- (ff) The prescribing, dispensing, or furnishing of dangerous drugs or devices, as defined in Section 4022, in violation of Section 2242.1.
- 1681. In addition to other acts constituting unprofessional conduct within the meaning of this chapter, it is unprofessional conduct for a person licensed under this chapter to do any of the following:
- (a) Obtain or possess in violation of law, or except as directed by a licensed physician and surgeon, dentist, or podiatrist, administer to himself, any controlled substance, as defined in Division 10 (commencing with Section 11000) of the Health and Safety Code, or any dangerous drug as defined in Article 8 (commencing with Section 4211) of Chapter 9.
- (b) Use any controlled substance, as defined in Division 10 (commencing with Section 11000) of the Health and Safety Code, or any dangerous drug as defined in Article 8 (commencing with Section 4211) of Chapter 9, or alcoholic beverages or other intoxicating substances, to an extent or in a manner dangerous or injurious to himself, to any person, or the public to the extent that such use impairs his ability to conduct with safety to the public the practice authorized by his license.
- (c) The conviction of a charge of violating any federal statute or rules, or any statute or rule of this state, regulating controlled substances, as defined in Division 10 (commencing with Section 11000) of the Health and Safety Code, or any dangerous drug, as defined in Article 8 (commencing with Section 4211) of Chapter 9, or the conviction of more than one misdemeanor, or any felony, involving the use or consumption of alcohol or drugs, if the conviction is

substantially related to the practice authorized by his license. The record of conviction or certified copy thereof, certified by the clerk of the court or by the judge in whose court the conviction is had, shall be conclusive evidence of a violation of this section; a plea or verdict of guilty or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere is deemed to be a conviction within the meaning of this section; the board may order the license suspended or revoked, or may decline to issue a license, when the time for appeal has elapsed or the judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal, or when an order granting probation is made suspending imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under any provision of the Penal Code, including, but not limited to, Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code, allowing such person to withdraw his plea of guilty and to enter a plea of not guilty, or setting aside the verdict of guilty, or dismissing the accusation, information or indictment.

- 1682. In addition to other acts constituting unprofessional conduct under this chapter, it is unprofessional conduct for:
- (a) Any dentist performing dental procedures to have more than one patient undergoing conscious sedation or general anesthesia on an outpatient basis at any given time unless each patient is being continuously monitored on a one-to-one ratio while sedated by either the dentist or another licensed health professional authorized by law to administer conscious sedation or general anesthesia.
- (b) Any dentist with patients recovering from conscious sedation or general anesthesia to fail to have the patients closely monitored by licensed health professionals experienced in the care and resuscitation of patients recovering from conscious sedation or general anesthesia. If one licensed professional is responsible for the recovery care of more than one patient at a time, all of the patients shall be physically in the same room to allow continuous visual contact with all patients and the patient to recovery staff ratio should not exceed three to one.
- (c) Any dentist with patients who are undergoing conscious sedation to fail to have these patients continuously monitored during the dental procedure with a pulse oximeter or similar or superior monitoring equipment required by the board.
- (d) Any dentist with patients who are undergoing conscious sedation to have dental office personnel directly involved with the care of those patients who are not certified in basic cardiac life support (CPR) and recertified biennially.
- (e) Any dentist to fail to obtain the written informed consent of a patient prior to administering general anesthesia or conscious sedation. In the case of a minor, the consent shall be obtained from the child's parent or guardian.
- 1683. (a) Every dentist, dental health professional, or other licensed health professional who performs a service on a patient in a dental office shall identify himself or herself in the patient record by signing his or her name, or an identification number and initials, next to the service performed and shall date those treatment entries in the record. Any person licensed under this chapter who owns, operates, or manages a dental office shall ensure compliance with this requirement.

(b) Repeated violations of this section constitutes unprofessional conduct.

1684. In addition to other acts constituting unprofessional conduct under this chapter, it is unprofessional conduct for a person licensed under this chapter to perform, or hold himself or herself out as able to perform, professional services beyond the scope of his or her license and field or fields of competence as established by his or her education, experience, training, or any combination thereof. This includes, but is not limited to, the use of any instrument or device in a manner that is not in accordance with the customary standards and practices of the dental profession.

This section shall not apply to research conducted by accredited dental schools or colleges, or to research conducted pursuant to an investigational device exemption issued by the United States Food and Drug Administration.

- 1684.1. (a) (1) A licensee who fails or refuses to comply with a request for the dental records of a patient, that is accompanied by that patient's written authorization for release of record to the board, within 15 days of receiving the request and authorization, shall pay to the board a civil penalty of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) per day for each day that the documents have not been produced after the 15th day, up to a maximum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) unless the licensee is unable to provide the documents within this time period for good cause.
- (2) A health care facility shall comply with a request for the dental records of a patient that is accompanied by that patient's written authorization for release of records to the board together with a notice citing this section and describing the penalties for failure to comply with this section. Failure to provide the authorizing patient's dental records to the board within 30 days of receiving this request, authorization, and notice shall subject the health care facility to a civil penalty, payable to the board, of up to two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) per day for each day that the documents have not been produced after the 30th day, up to a maximum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), unless the health care facility is unable to provide the documents within this time period for good cause. This paragraph shall not require health care facilities to assist the board in obtaining the patient's authorization. The board shall pay the reasonable cost of copying the dental records.
- (b) (1) A licensee who fails or refuses to comply with a court order, issued in the enforcement of a subpoena, mandating the release of records to the board shall pay to the board a civil penalty of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per day for each day that the documents have not been produced after the date by which the court order requires the documents to be produced, unless it is determined that the order is unlawful or invalid. Any statute of limitations applicable to the filing of an accusation by the board shall be tolled during the period the licensee is out of compliance with the court order and during any related appeals.
- (2) Any licensee who fails or refuses to comply with a court order, issued in the enforcement of a subpoena, mandating the release of records to the board is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine payable to the board not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000). The fine shall be added to the licensee's renewal fee if it is not paid by the next succeeding renewal date. Any statute of

limitations applicable to the filing of an accusation by the board shall be tolled during the period the licensee is out of compliance with the court order and during any related appeals.

- (3) A health care facility that fails or refuses to comply with a court order, issued in the enforcement of a subpoena, mandating the release of patient records to the board, that is accompanied by a notice citing this section and describing the penalties for failure to comply with this section, shall pay to the board a civil penalty of up to one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per day for each day that the documents have not been produced, up to ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), after the date by which the court order requires the documents to be produced, unless it is determined that the order is unlawful or invalid. Any statute of limitations applicable to the filing of an accusation by the board against a licensee shall be tolled during the period the health care facility is out of compliance with the court order and during any related appeals.
- (4) Any health care facility that fails or refuses to comply with a court order, issued in the enforcement of a subpoena, mandating the release of records to the board is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine payable to the board not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000). Any statute of limitations applicable to the filing of an accusation by the board against a licensee shall be tolled during the period the health care facility is out of compliance with the court order and during any related appeals.
- (c) Multiple acts by a licensee in violation of subdivision (b) shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) or by imprisonment in a county jail not exceeding six months, or by both that fine and imprisonment. Multiple acts by a health care facility in violation of subdivision (b) shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) and shall be reported to the State Department of Health Services and shall be considered as grounds for disciplinary action with respect to licensure, including suspension or revocation of the license or certificate.
- (d) A failure or refusal to comply with a court order, issued in the enforcement of a subpoena, mandating the release of records to the board constitutes unprofessional conduct and is grounds for suspension or revocation of his or her license.
- (e) Imposition of the civil penalties authorized by this section shall be in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 5 (commencing with Section 11500) of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code).
- (f) For the purposes of this section, a "health care facility" means a clinic or health care facility licensed or exempt from licensure pursuant to Division 2 (commencing with Section 1200) of the Health and Safety Code.
- 1684.5. (a) In addition to other acts constituting unprofessional conduct under this chapter, it is unprofessional conduct for any dentist to perform or allow to be performed any treatment on a patient who is not a patient of record of that dentist. A dentist may, however, after conducting a preliminary oral examination, require or permit any dental auxiliary to perform procedures necessary for diagnostic purposes, provided that the procedures are permitted under the auxiliary's authorized scope of practice. Additionally, a dentist may require or permit a dental auxiliary to

perform all of the following duties prior to any examination of the patient by the dentist, provided that the duties are authorized for the particular classification of dental auxiliary pursuant to Article 7 (commencing with Section 1740):

- (1) Expose emergency radiographs upon direction of the dentist.
- (2) Perform extra-oral duties or functions specified by the dentist.
- (3) Perform mouth-mirror inspections of the oral cavity, to include charting of obvious lesions, malocclusions, existing restorations, and missing teeth.
- (b) For purposes of this section, "patient of record" refers to a patient who has been examined, has had a medical and dental history completed and evaluated, and has had oral conditions diagnosed and a written plan developed by the licensed dentist.
- (c) This section shall not apply to dentists providing examinations on a temporary basis outside of a dental office in settings including, but not limited to, health fairs and school screenings.
- (d) This section shall not apply to fluoride mouth rinse or supplement programs administered in a school or preschool setting.
- 1685. In addition to other acts constituting unprofessional conduct under this chapter, it is unprofessional conduct for a person licensed under this chapter to require, either directly or through an office policy, or knowingly permit the delivery of dental care that discourages necessary treatment or permits clearly excessive treatment, incompetent treatment, grossly negligent treatment, repeated negligent acts, or unnecessary treatment, as determined by the standard of practice in the community.
- 1686. A person whose license, certificate, or permit has been revoked or suspended, who has been placed on probation, or whose license, certificate, or permit was surrendered pursuant to a stipulated settlement as a condition to avoid a disciplinary administrative hearing, may petition the board for reinstatement or modification of penalty, including modification or termination of probation, after a period of not less than the following minimum periods have elapsed from the effective date of the decision ordering disciplinary action:
- (a) At least three years for reinstatement of a license revoked for unprofessional conduct or surrendered pursuant to a stipulated settlement as a condition to avoid an administrative disciplinary hearing.
- (b) At least two years for early termination, or modification of a condition, of a probation of three years or more.
- (c) At least one year for modification of a condition, or reinstatement of a license revoked for mental or physical illness, or termination, or modification of a condition, of a probation of less than three years.

The petition shall state any fact required by the board.

The petition may be heard by the board, or the board may assign the petition to an administrative law judge designated in Section 11371 of the Government Code.

In considering reinstatement or modification or penalty, the board

or the administrative law judge hearing the petition may consider (1) all activities of the petitioner since the disciplinary action was taken, (2) the offense for which the petitioner was disciplined, (3) the petitioner's activities during the time the license, certificate, or permit was in good standing, and (4) the petitioner's rehabilitative efforts, general reputation for truth, and professional ability. The hearing may be continued from time to time as the board or the administrative law judge as designated in Section 11371 of the Government Code finds necessary.

The board or the administrative law judge may impose necessary terms and conditions on the licentiate in reinstating a license, certificate, or permit or modifying a penalty.

No petition under this section shall be considered while the petitioner is under sentence for any criminal offense, including any period during which the petitioner is on court-imposed probation or parole. No petition shall be considered while there is an accusation or petition to revoke probation pending against the person. The board may deny without a hearing or argument any petition filed pursuant to this section within a period of two years from the effective date of the prior decision following a hearing under this section.

Nothing in this section shall be deemed to alter Sections 822 and 823.

CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS

Dental Practice Act

Article 3.1. Radiation Safety Courses

Chapter 1 - Article 3.1 - Approval of Radiation Safety Courses

§1014. Approval of Radiation Safety Courses.

- (a) A radiation safety course is one which has as its primary purpose providing theory and clinical application in radiographic techniques. A single standard of care shall be maintained and the board shall approve only those courses which continuously maintain a high quality standard of instruction.
- (b) A radiation safety course applying for approval shall submit to the board an application and other required documents and information on forms prescribed by the board. The board may approve or deny approval of any such course. Approval may be granted after evaluation of all components of the course has been performed and the report of such evaluation indicates that the course meets the board's requirements. The board may, in lieu of conducting its own investigation, accept the findings of any commission or accreditation agency approved by the board and adopt those findings as its own.
- (c) The board may withdraw its approval of a course at any time, after giving the course provider written notice setting forth its reason for withdrawal and after affording a reasonable opportunity to respond. Approval may be withdrawn for failure to comply with the board's standards or for fraud, misrepresentation or violation of any applicable federal or state laws relating to the operation of radiographic equipment.
- (d) The processing times for radiation safety course approval are set forth in Section 1061.

§1014.1. Requirements for Radiation Safety Courses.

A radiation safety course shall comply with the requirements set forth below in order to secure and maintain approval by the board. The course of instruction in radiation safety and radiography techniques offered by a school or program approved by the board for instruction in dentistry, dental hygiene or dental assisting shall be deemed to be an approved radiation safety course if the school or program has submitted evidence satisfactory to the board that it meets all the requirements set forth below.

- (a) **Educational Level**. The course shall be established at the postsecondary educational level or a level deemed equivalent thereto by the board.
- (b) **Program Director**. The program director, who may also be an instructor, shall actively participate in and be responsible for at least all of the following:
- (1) Providing daily guidance of didactic, laboratory and clinical assignments;
- (2) Maintaining all necessary records, including but not limited to the following:
- (A) Copies of current curriculum, course outline and objectives;
- (B) Faculty credentials;
- (C) Individual student records, which shall include pre-clinical and clinical evaluations, examinations and copies of all successfully completed radiographic series used toward course completion. Records shall be maintained for at least five years from the date of course completion.
- (3) Issuing certificates to each student who has successfully completed the course and maintaining a record of each certificate for at least five years from the date of its issuance;
- (4) Transmitting to the board on a form prescribed by the board the name, last four digits of the social security number and, where applicable, license number of each student who has successfully completed the course;
- (5) Informing the board of any significant revisions to the curriculum or course outlines.
- (c) **Faculty**. The faculty shall be adequate in number, qualifications and composition and shall be suitably qualified through academic preparation, professional expertise, and/or appropriate training, as provided herein. Each faculty member shall possess the following qualifications:
- (1) Hold a valid special permit or valid license as a dentist, registered dental hygienist, registered dental assistant, registered dental assistant in extended functions, registered dental hygienist in extended functions, or registered dental hygienists in alternative practice issued by the board;
- (2) All faculty shall have been licensed for a minimum of two years. All faculty shall have the education, background, and occupational experience and/or teaching expertise necessary to

perform, teach, and evaluate dental radiographs. All faculty responsible for clinical evaluation shall have completed a two hour methodology course which shall include clinical evaluation criteria, course outline development, process evaluation, and product evaluation;

- (3) Shall have either passed the radiation safety examination administered by the board or equivalent licensing examination as a dentist, registered dental hygienist, registered dental assistant, registered dental assistant in extended functions, registered dental hygienist in extended functions, or registered dental hygienists in alternative practice or, on or after January 1, 1985, shall have successfully completed a board approved radiation safety course.
- (d) **Facilities**. There shall be a sufficient number of safe, adequate, and educationally conducive lecture classrooms, radiography operatories, developing or processing facilities, and viewing spaces for mounting, viewing and evaluating radiographs. Adequate sterilizing facilities shall be provided and all disinfection and sterilization procedures specified by board regulations shall be followed.
- (1) A radiographic operatory shall be deemed adequate if it fully complies with the California Radiation Control Regulations (Title 17, Cal. Code Regs., commencing with section 30100), is properly equipped with supplies and equipment for practical work and includes for every seven students at least one functioning radiography machine which is adequately filtered and collimated in compliance with Department of Health Services regulations and which is equipped with the appropriate position-indicating devices for each technique being taught.
- (2) The developing or processing facility shall be deemed adequate if it is of sufficient size, based upon the number of students, to accommodate students' needs in learning processing procedures and is properly equipped with supplies and equipment for practical work using either manual or automatic equipment.
- (3) X-ray areas shall provide protection to patients, students, faculty and observers in full compliance with applicable statutes and regulations.
- (e) **Program Content.** Sufficient time shall be available for all students to obtain laboratory and clinical experience to achieve minimum competence in the various protocols used in the application of dental radiographic techniques.
- (1) A detailed course outline shall be provided to the board which clearly states curriculum subject matter and specific instructional hours in the individual areas of didactic, laboratory, and clinical instruction.
- (2) General program objectives and specific instructional unit objectives shall be stated in writing, and shall include theoretical aspects of each subject as well as practical application. The theoretical aspects of the program shall provide the content necessary for students to make judgments regarding dental radiation exposure. The course shall assure that students who successfully complete the course can expose, process and evaluate dental radiographs with minimum competence.

- (3) Objective evaluation criteria shall be used for measuring student progress toward attainment of specific course objectives. Students shall be provided with specific unit objectives and the evaluation criteria that will be used for all aspects of the curriculum including written, practical and clinical examinations.
- (4) Areas of instruction shall include at least the following as they relate to exposure, processing and evaluations of dental radiographs:
- (A) Radiation physics and biology.
- (B) Radiation protection and safety.
- (C) Recognition of normal anatomical landmarks and abnormal conditions of the oral cavity as they relate to dental radiographs.
- (D) Radiograph exposure and processing techniques using either manual or automatic methods.
- (E) Radiograph mounting or sequencing, and viewing, including anatomical landmarks of the oral cavity.
- (F) Intraoral techniques and dental radiograph armamentaria, including holding devices.
- (G) Interproximal examination including principles of exposure, methods of retention and evaluation.
- (H) Intraoral examination including, principles of exposure, methods of retention and evaluation.
- (I) Identification and correction of faulty radiographs.
- (J) Supplemental techniques including the optional use of computerized digital radiography.
- (K) Infection control in dental radiographic procedures.
- (L) Radiographic record management. Students may be given the opportunity to obtain credit by the use of challenge examinations and other methods of evaluation.
- (f) **Laboratory Instruction**. Sufficient hours of laboratory instruction shall be provided to ensure that a student successfully completes on an x-ray manikin at least the procedures set forth below. A procedure has been successfully completed only if each radiograph is of diagnostic quality. There shall be no more than 6 students per instructor during laboratory instruction.
- (1) Two full mouth periapical series, consisting of at least 18 radiographs each, 4 of which

must be bitewings; no more than one series may be completed using computer digital radiographic equipment;

- (2) Two bitewing series, consisting of at least 4 radiographs each;
- (3) Developing or processing, and mounting or sequencing of exposed radiographs;
- (4) Student and instructor written evaluation of radiographs.
- (g) **Clinical Experience**. The course of instruction shall include sufficient clinical experience, as part of an organized program of instruction, to obtain clinical competency in radiographic techniques. There shall be no more than 6 students per instructor during clinical instruction. Clinical instruction shall include clinical experience on four patients with one of the four patients used for the clinical examination. Clinical experience shall include:
- (1) Successful completion of a minimum of four full mouth periapical series, consisting of at least 18 radiographs each, 4 of which must be bitewings. Traditional film packets must be double film. No more than three series may be completed using computer digital radiographic equipment. Such radiographs shall be of diagnostic quality. All exposures made on human subjects shall only be made for diagnostic purposes, and shall in no event exceed three (3) exposures per subject. All clinical procedures on human subjects shall be performed under the supervision of a licensed dentist in accordance with section 106975 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (2) Developing or processing, and mounting or sequencing of exposed human subject radiographs;
- (3) Student and instructor written evaluation of radiographs.
- (h) **Clinical Facilities**. There shall be a written contract of affiliation with each clinical facility utilized by a course. Such contract shall describe the settings in which the clinical training will be received and shall provide that the clinical facility has the necessary equipment and accessories appropriate for the procedures to be performed and that such equipment and accessories are in safe operating condition. Such clinical facilities shall be subject to the same requirements as those specified in subdivision (g).
- (i) **Length of Course**. The program shall be of sufficient duration for the student to develop minimum competence in the radiation safety techniques, but shall in no event be less than 32 clock hours, including at least 8 hours of didactic instruction, at least 12 hours of laboratory instruction, and at least 12 hours of clinical instruction.
- (j) **Certificates**. A certificate shall be issued to each student who successfully completes the course. The certificate shall specify the number of course hours completed. A student shall be deemed to have successfully completed the course if the student has met all the course requirements and has obtained passing scores on both written and clinical examinations.

Article 4. Continuing Education

§1015. Purposes.

The board has determined that the public health and safety will be served by requiring all holders of licenses granted by the board under the Code to continue their education after receiving such licenses. Note: Authority cited: Sections 1614 and 1645, Business and Professions Code. Reference: Section 1645, Business and Professions Code.

§1016. Providers and Courses.

- (a) Course of Study Defined. "Course of study" means an orderly learning experience in the area of dental and medical health, preventive dental services, diagnosis and treatment planning, clinical procedures, basic health sciences, dental practice administration, or the Dental Practice Act and other laws specifically related to dental practice which is designed to directly enhance the licensee's knowledge, skill or competence in the provision of service to patients or the community.
- (1) Category I: Courses in this category shall include courses in the actual delivery of dental services to the patient or the community. Such courses shall also include:
- (A) Mandatory courses required by the Board for license renewal, such as Infection Control, California Dental Practice Act and a course in Basic Life Support as approved by American Red Cross or American Heart Association. At a minimum, course content for Infection Control shall include all content of Section 1005. At a minimum, course content for the Dental Practice Act [Division 2, Chapter 4 of the Code (beginning with § 1600)] shall instruct on acts in violation of the Dental Practice Act and attending regulations, and other statutory mandates relating to the dental practice. This includes utilization and scope of practice for auxiliaries; scope of practice for dentists; laws governing the prescribing of drugs; citations, fines, revocation, and suspension, and license renewal.
- (B) Courses in preventive services, diagnosis (including physical evaluation, radiography, dental photography) and comprehensive treatment planning.
- (C) Courses dealing primarily with nutrition counseling of the patient.
- (D) Courses in corrective and restorative oral health treatment.
- (E) Courses in dentistry's role in individual and community health emergencies and disasters.
- (F) Courses that pertain to the legal requirement governing the licensee in the areas of auxiliary employment and delegation of responsibilities; the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability

- Act (HIPAA); actual delivery of care; and workplace, environmental and general safety.
- (G) Courses addressing office instrument sterilization systems.
- (2) Category II: Courses in this category shall include other courses directly related to the practice of dentistry. Such courses shall include:
- (A) courses addressing the evaluation, improvement and/or methods of correction for recall and scheduling systems.
- (B) courses in organization and management of the dental practice including office design, and ergonomics, and the improvement of office operations for the patient's benefit and/or to improve the continuity of care provided to the patient.
- (C) courses addressing the implementation and/or mechanism of alternative delivery systems.
- (D) courses addressing patient record keeping.
- (E) courses in skills such as communication, behavioral sciences, patient management and motivation when oriented specifically to the needs of the dental practice and will improve the health of the patient.
- (F) courses in other subjects of direct concern to dentistry such as dentolegal matters, including but not limited to risk management, liability, and malpractice, employment law and employment practices.
- (G) courses in methods of health care delivery and sociopolitical problems directly involving dentistry.
- (3) Courses considered to be outside the scope of the continuing education program include, but are not limited to, those in the following areas:
- (A) money management, the licensee's personal finances or personal business matters;
- (B) basic educational or cultural subjects not related to the practice of dentistry;
- (C) general physical fitness or the licensee's personal health;
- (D) presentations by political or public figures or other persons that do not deal primarily with dental practice;
- (E) basic skills such as memory training and speed reading;
- (F) courses addressing the computerized dental office when the topic involves record management or new technology designed primarily for the licensee's understanding and benefit; (G) courses designed to make the licensee a better business person or designed to improve licensee or staff motivation;
- (H) courses pertaining to the improvement of office operations, licensee and staff convenience, or profit motive;
- (I) courses which address increased office production; financial planning; employee benefits; marketing or motivational topics to increase productivity or profitability;
- (J) courses in which the primary beneficiary is the licensee.
- (b) Application and Renewal.
- (1) A "registered provider" is one who offers courses of study for credit toward satisfying the continuing education requirements of the board. Application for registration as a provider shall be made on a form prescribed by the board and shall be accompanied by the fee required by section 1021 and documentation that the provider meets the requirements set forth below.
- (2) Every provider's registration expires two years from the date of its issuance. A provider may renew its registration by filing an application for renewal on a form prescribed by the board, accompanied by the fee required by section 1021 and a list of all courses offered during the last renewal period pursuant to its registration, the name and qualifications of each instructor, and a summary of the content of each course of study.
- (c) Standards for Registration. Those providers requesting registration shall meet the following criteria:

- (1) Each course of study shall be conducted on the same educational standards of scholarship and teaching as that required of a true university discipline and shall be supported by those facilities and educational resources necessary to comply with this requirement. Every instructor shall have education or experience within the last five years in the subject being taught. Each course of study shall clearly state educational objectives that can realistically be accomplished within the framework of the course. Teaching methods for each course of study shall be described (e.g., lecture, seminar, audiovisual, clinical, simulation, etc.). Each participant shall be given the opportunity to provide a written evaluation of the quality of the course.
- (2) The topic of instruction shall conform to subsection (a) above.
- (3) An opportunity to enroll in such courses of study is available to all dental licensees.
- (4) Reference by providers to courses offered for credit toward satisfying the board's continuing education requirements shall be limited to the announcement: "This provider is authorized to confer _____ units of California continuing education credit."
- (d) Enforcement and Availability of Records. The board will not give prior approval to individual courses unless a course is required as a mandatory license renewal course. The minimum course content of all mandatory continuing education courses for all registered providers is set out in subsection (a)(1)(A). Providers shall be expected to adhere to these minimum course requirements or risk registered provider status. Beginning January 1, 2006, all registered providers shall submit their course outlines for Infection Control and California Dental Practice Act to the board staff for review and approval. All new applicants for provider status shall submit course outlines for mandatory education courses at the time of application and prior to instruction of mandatory education courses. In addition, the board will randomly audit other courses submitted for credit in addition to any course for which a complaint is received. If an audit is made, course organizers will be asked to submit to the board:
- (1) Faculty curriculum vitae;
- (2) Course content;
- (3) Educational objectives;
- (4) Teaching methods;
- (5) Evidence of evaluation;
- (6) Attendance records.
- (e) Withdrawal of Registration.
- (1) The board retains the right and authority to audit or monitor courses given by any provider. The board may withdraw or place restrictions on a provider's registration if the provider has disseminated any false or misleading information in connection with the continuing education program, fails to comply with regulations, misrepresents the course offered, makes any false statement on its application or otherwise violates any provision of the Dental Practice Act or the regulations adopted thereunder.
- (2) Any provider whose registration is withdrawn or restricted shall be given a hearing before the board prior to the effective date of such action. The provider shall be given at least ten days notice of the grounds for the proposed action and the time and place of such hearing.
- (f) Units of Credit for Attendance. One unit of credit shall be granted for every hour of contact instruction. This credit shall apply to either academic or clinical instruction. Eight units shall be the maximum continuing education credits granted in one day.
- (g) Provider Responsibility.
- (1) It shall be the responsibility of the provider to furnish a written certification to the licensee certifying that the licensee has met the attendance requirements of the course. Such certification shall not be issued until completion of the course and shall contain the provider's name, course registration

number, dates attended and units earned filled in by the provider. Additionally, space shall be provided for the licensee's printed name, signature and license number.

- (2) When two or more registered providers co-sponsor a course, only one provider number shall be used for that course and that provider must assume full responsibility for compliance with the requirements of this article.
- (h) Out of State Course. A licensee who attends a course or program which meets all requirements for continuing education courses but which was given outside California by an unregistered provider may request continuing education credit by submitting information on course content and duration to the board and furnishing evidence from the provider of the course that the licensee was in attendance. In the case of a scientific meeting or convention, such evidence shall indicate that the licensee attended the specific lecture for which credit is requested. When the necessary requirements have been fulfilled, the board may issue a written certification which the licensee may then use for documentation of continuing education credits.

§1016.1. Processing Times.

§1017. Units Required for Renewal of License.

- (a) Effective January 1, 2006 as a condition of renewal, licensees are required to complete continuing education units for license renewal in each of the following subjects: (1) infection control and (2) California Dental Practice Act and attending regulations. Dentists and Dental Auxiliaries will be required to complete a minimum of 80% of their required units for license renewal in Category I subjects including two units of continuing education in infection control and two units in the California Dental Practice Act, and no more than 20% of their required units in Category II subjects. The mandatory units will count toward the total units required to renew a license, however, failure to complete the mandatory courses will result in non-renewal of a license. Any continuing education units accumulated before January 1, 2006, that meet the requirements in effect on the date the units were accumulated will be accepted by the board for license renewals taking place on or after January 1, 2006.
- (b) Every licensee shall accumulate the continuing education units equal to the number of units indicated below during the biennial license renewal period and shall assure the board that he/she will accumulate such units during the succeeding two year renewal period; except that those new licensees who have been issued a license to practice for a period less than 2 years shall commence accumulating continuing education credits with the next biennial renewal period occurring after the issuance of a license to practice. As part of the continuing education requirements, each licensee shall complete, at least once every two years, a course in basic life support approved by the American Red Cross or the American Heart Association. Each licensee who holds a general anesthesia permit shall take and complete, at least once every two years, either (1) an advanced cardiac life support course which is approved by the American Heart Association and which includes an examination on the materials presented in the course or (2) any other advanced cardiac life support course which is identical in all respects, except for the omission of materials that relate solely to hospital emergencies or neonatology, to the course entitled "Guidelines 2000 for Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation and Emergency Cardiovascular Care" published by the American Heart Association in August 2000, which is incorporated herein by reference. Each licensee who holds a conscious sedation permit shall take and complete at least once every two years at least 15 total units of courses related to the administration of conscious sedation and to medical emergencies. Refusal to execute the required assurance shall result in non-renewal of the license.
- (1) Dentists: 50 units.
- (2) Registered dental hygienists: 25 units.
- (3) Registered dental assistants: 25 units.
- (4) Registered dental hygienists in extended functions: 25 units.
- (5) Registered dental assistants in extended functions: 25 units.
- (6) Registered dental hygienists in alternative practice 35 units.
- (c) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this code, tape recorded courses, home study materials, video courses, and computer courses are considered correspondence courses, and if from registered providers, will be accepted for credit up to, but not exceeding, half of the total required credits. Interactive instruction courses such as live lecture, live telephone conferencing, live video conferencing, or live classroom study from registered providers, will be accepted for full credit.

 (d) The license of any person who fails to accumulate the continuing education units set forth in (a) and (b) or to assure the heard that he/she will accumulate such units, shall not be renewed until such
- (d) The license of any person who fails to accumulate the continuing education units set forth in (a) and (b), or to assure the board that he/she will accumulate such units, shall not be renewed until such time as the licensee complies with those requirements.
- (e) A licensee who has not practiced in California for more than one year because the licensee is disabled need not comply with the continuing education requirements of this article during the renewal period within which such disability falls. Such licensee shall certify that he/she is eligible for

waiver of the continuing education requirements. A licensee who ceases to be eligible for such waiver shall comply with the continuing education requirements for subsequent renewal periods. (f) A licensee who applies for license renewal shall, on a form provided by the board, provide a summary of continuing education units earned during the license renewal period. The licensee shall retain for a period of four years the certifications issued to him/her at the time he/she attended the course and shall forward such certifications to the board only upon request by the board. A licensee who fails to retain a certification shall contact the provider and obtain a duplicate certification. Providers may issue duplicate certifications only to licensees whose names appear on the provider's roster of course attendees. The certification shall be clearly marked "duplicate" and shall contain the licensee's name, as well as the provider's name, course registration number, dates attended, and units earned. Any licensee who furnishes false or misleading information to the board regarding his continuing education units shall be subject to disciplinary action. The board will audit such licensee records as it deems necessary to assure that the continuing education requirements are met.

§1017.2. Inactive Licenses.

(a) A licensee who desires an inactive license shall submit an application to the board on a form provided by the board. (b) In order to restore an inactive license to active status, the licensee shall submit an application to the board on a form provided by the board, accompanied by evidence that the licensee has completed the required number of hours of approved continuing education in compliance with this article within the last two years preceding such application. (c) The holder of an inactive license shall continue to pay to the board the required biennial renewal fee. (d) The board shall inform an applicant who wishes to activate/inactivate his/her license in writing with 30 days whether the application is complete and accepted for filing or is deficient and what specific information is required. The board shall decide within 30 days after the filing of a completed application whether the applicant meets the requirements

Article 7. Advertising

§1050. Fee Advertising.

Pursuant to Section 651(c) of the Code, fee advertising must be accurate and precise. Fees for dental services may be advertised provided the advertisement fully discloses all services customarily included by the dental profession as part of the advertised service, including but not limited to necessary diagnosis, radiographs, restorative treatment, drugs, local anesthesia or analgesia, materials, laboratory fees and post-operative care. The advertisement must also disclose any additional services not part of the procedure but for which the patient will be charged, together with the fees for such services.

§1051. Advertising Discounts.

An advertisement of a discount must:

- (a) List the dollar amount of the non-discounted fee for the service; and
- (b) List either the dollar amount of the discount fee or the percentage of the discount for the specific service; and
- (c) Inform the public of the length of time, if any, the discount will be honored; and
- (d) List verifiable fees pursuant to Section 651 of the Code; and
- (e) Identify specific groups who qualify for the discount or any other terms and conditions or restrictions for qualifying for the discount.

§1052. Advertising Claims.

- (a) Any advertisement must be capable of substantiation, particularly that the services offered are actually delivered and at the fees advertised.
- (b) Illustrations, graphics or visuals used in any type of advertising may include only those permitted by Section 651 of the Code. These may include, for example:
- (1) Representations of the dentist, the dentist's staff or facility.
- (2) Representations of other people, provided that these are not used to make claims of professional superiority (including testimonials), illustrate any dental condition, or the recovery therefrom.
- (3) Representations of single teeth, dentures, or other dental appliances, provided that these are not used to illustrate any dental condition, recovery therefrom, or to make claims of professional superiority.

§1053. Advertising Dentures.

Advertising of dentures shall include the following information:

- (a) Whether these are preformed or custom-made.
- (b) In the case of "immediate dentures," details of (including charges for) later relines or other necessary procedures.
- (c) Advertising may include fees for various grades of dentures, providing that potentially misleading descriptive phrases are not used and the advertising discloses the major variables. Note: Authority cited: Sections 651 and 1614, Business and Professions Code. Reference: Section 651, Business and Professions Code.

§1054. Recognized Dental Specialty Boards and Associations.

For purposes of this article and Section 651 of the Code, the board recognizes those dental specialty boards which are affiliated with specialties recognized by the American Dental Association, including: American Board of Dental Public Health; American Board of Endodontics; American Board of Oral Pathology; American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery; American Board of Orthodontics; American Board of Pediatric Dentistry; American Board of Periodontology; and American Board of Prosthodontics. The board also recognizes those boards that require two or more years of training in a formal advanced education program affiliated with a school of dentistry or medicine that follows educational guidelines developed by the Council on Dental Education of the American Dental Association, dated January 1975, which are hereby incorporated by reference. Note: Authority cited: Sections 651 and 1614, Business and Professions Code. Reference: Section 651, Business and Professions Code.

§1054.1. Advertising Credentials.

- (a) A dentist may advertise that he or she has credentials from one of the dental specialty boards recognized by the Board of Dental Examiners of the State of California, pursuant to Section 1054.
- (b) A dentist may not advertise credentials granted by a private or public board or parent association which is not recognized pursuant to Section 1054, unless:
- (1) The private or public board or parent association which grants the credentials currently requires:
- (A) Successful completion of an oral and written examination based on psychometric principles; and
- (B) Training and experience subsequent to successful completion of (A) above, to assure competent practice in the dental discipline as determined by the private or public board or parent association which grants the credentials.
- (2) Any advertisement which references the dentist's credentials shall include the following statement: "[Name of announced dental discipline] is a discipline not recognized as a dental specialty by the Board of Dental Examiners of the State of California".
- (3) The dentist discloses that he or she is a general dentist in any advertising which references the dentist's credentials.
- (c) Subdivision (b)(1)(B) shall not be construed to prohibit a dentist from advertising credentials on the basis that the credentials were granted without examination if the credentials were granted prior to 1985.

§1054.2. Advertising as a Specialist.

A dentist may not advertise that he or she is a "specialist" unless he or she is certified or eligible for certification by a dental specialty board recognized pursuant to Section 1054.

§1054.3. Definition of Advertising.

- (a) For purposes of this article, "advertising" or "advertisement" means:
- (1) Any written or printed communication for the purpose of soliciting, describing, or promoting a dentist's licensed activities, including a brochure, letter, pamphlet, newspaper, telephone listing, periodical, business card or other writing.
- (2) Any directory listing caused or permitted by a dentist which indicates his or her licensed activity.
- (3) Any radio, television, computer network or similar airwave or electronic transmission which solicits or promotes the dentist's practice.
- (4) Any printing or writing on novelty objects or dental care products.
- (b) "Advertising" or "advertisement" does not include any of the following:
- (1) Any printing or writing used on buildings, uniforms or badges, where the purpose of the writing is for identification.
- (2) Any printing or writing on memoranda or other communications used in the ordinary course of business where the sole purpose of the writing is other than the solicitation or promotion of the dentist's practice.

Complaints

The following information is intended to inform consumers of the procedures for filing a complaint against individuals licensed by the Dental Board of California. Board licensees are those who practice in the following license categories:

- Dentists (DDS)
- Registered Dental Hygienists (RDH)
- Registered Dental Hygienists in Alternative Practice (RDHAP)
- Registered Dental Hygienists in Extended Function (RDHEF)
- Registered Dental Assistants (RDA)
- Registered Dental Assistants in Extended Function (RDAEF)

If you need information or have a problem with a **health plan (HMO)**, contact the **Department of Managed Health Care at 1-800-400-0815**

Who Can/Should File a Complaint With the Dental Board of California?

A complaint should be filed by anyone who believes that a licensee of the Board has engaged in

illegal activities which are related to his/her professional responsibilities. This includes substandard dental care rendered by any of the license categories mentioned above.

In addition, if you have evidence which indicates that an unlicensed person is participating in activities for which a license is required, you should report such activity to the Board.

Complaints involving allegations which are not within the jurisdiction of this Board may be referred to other agencies or organizations which may be better able to assist the complainant. Complaints not within the authority of the Board concern: fee/billing disputes, general business practices, and personality conflicts.

How Do I File a Complaint?

All complaints must be in writing.

The information contained in your complaint will determine what action the Board will take. Please provide a statement which describes the nature of your complaint. Include as many specific details as possible as well as any documentary evidence related to your complaint. This may include patient records, photographs, contracts, invoices, and correspondence. It is not necessary to refer to specific sections of the law which you feel have been violated. While anonymous complaints will be reviewed, they may be impossible to pursue without support from the complaintant.

How Are Complaints Processed?

The Board receives thousands of complaints each year. Within 10 days after receipt of each complaint, the Board's Complaint Unit sends a written notification of receipt to the complainant. Although complaints are reviewed daily, the entire complaint review process may take an extended period of time to determine appropriate action. The Board seriously reviews each complaint to ensure consumers are protected from substandard dental care. Once the review has been completed the complainant is notified of any final action taken by the Board.

Complaints involving quality of care issues require copies of dental records for review by the Board's Dental Consultants. An authorization for release of records must be obtained from the complainant. Copies of the dental records are obtained from all providers of the dental services. All relevant information is reviewed by a Board Dental Consultant. If the Board is unable to substantiate a violation of law, the case may be closed but kept on file for a period dictated by law. If the Board is able to substantiate a violation of law, the case may be referred to the Office of the Attorney General for possible disciplinary action against the licensee.

Complaints are not disclosed to the public. However, once an accusation is filed, this document is available to the public.

Practitioners of dentistry, Article 2 Admission and Practice 1625.

A person practices dentistry if one does any of the following:

Advertises or represents to be a dentist

- Performs or offers to perform, an operation or diagnosis of any kind, or treats diseases or lesions of the human teeth, alveolar process, gums, jaws, or associated structures or corrects malposed positions thereof.
- Indicates that they will perform or agents or servants will, any operation upon human teeth, alveolar process, gums, jaws, or associated structures
- Indicates that they will construct, alter or repair or sell any bridge, crown, denture or prosthetic appliance or orthodontic appliance.
- Makes or offers to make, an examination of, with the intent to perform or cause to be performed any

The objective of this treatment shall be creation of an environment in which hard and soft tissues can be maintained in good health by the patient. (DPA 2002 page 351)

The practice of dental hygiene includes: 1760.5

• Dental hygiene assessment, development, planning and implementation of a dental hygiene care plan. It also includes oral health education, counseling and health screenings.

Licentiates must obtain at least 80% of their total required units in Category One subjects.

Category Two subjects will include:

"Other courses directly related to the practice of dentistry as determined by the board, courses addressing the evaluation, improvement and/or methods of correction for recall and scheduling systems, courses in organization and management of the dental practice including office design, and ergonomics, and the improvement of office operations for the patient's benefit and/or to improve the continuity of care provided to the patient, courses addressing office instrument sterilization systems, courses addressing the implementation and/or mechanism of alternative delivery systems, courses addressing patient record keeping, courses in skills such as communication, behavioral sciences, patient management and motivation when oriented specifically to the needs of the dental practice and will improve the health of the patient, courses in other subjects of direct concern to dentistry such as dentolegal matters, including but not limited to risk management, liability, and malpractice, employment law and employment practices, courses in methods of health care delivery and sociopolitical problems directly involving dentistry". Up to 20% of the total units required for license renewal may be taken in Category Two subjects.

- Abstain from the use of alcohol or drugs

- Limit practice to a supervised structured environment in which the licensee's activities shall be supervised by another dentist

The probation shall be for three years and the licensee may petition the board for early termination, or modification or a condition

Use of extended functions personnel 1770.

* What is it?

Diversion is a confidential program for dentists and dental auxiliaries licensed in California whose ability to practice may be impaired due to alcohol and/or drug abuse. The program offers a means of recovery without the loss of a license by providing access to appropriate intervention programs and treatment services. The Diversion Program must comply with the provisions in Business and Professions Code Section 1695.5.

*Why This Service?

The purpose of the Diversion Program is to protect the public and rehabilitate the licentiate, and is available to dental professionals meeting the eligibility criteria.

Dental Practice/Offices

- All dentists may use DDS Change location Notify DBC
- Additional offices Need to file application with DBC and pay fee
- Fictitious Name Need permit

Patient Access to Records

- Patient makes written request and may be charged reasonable clerical costs
- Copies provided within 15 days (including x-rays)
- May also provide written summary
- MUST maintain records for a minimum of 7 years after ceasing to practice

<u>Unprofessional Conduct</u>

- Obtain fee by fraud
- Excessive Rx of drugs
- Allowing person to practice outside of scope
- Unsanitary office conditions
- Advertising "painless" procedures ... advertising of either professional superiority or performance of professional services in a superior manner
- Alter patient records with intent to deceive
- Performance of treatment on patient who is not "patient of record"
- "Patient of record" refers to patient who has been examined, had medical/dental history completed & evaluated, oral conditions diagnosed, and written treatment plan developed by licensed DDS
- Patient Abandonment Failure to follow infection control guidelines
- Discourage necessary treatment or permit excessive treatment

Criminal Offense

- Allowable Duties Statues and regulations specifically define the duties that each category of auxiliary is allowed to perform, the level of dentist supervision required, and the settings in which the duties may be performed. It is a criminal offense to perform illegal functions, as well as grounds for license discipline of both the person performing the illegal function and any person who aid or abets such illegal activity.
- · Complaints Against Licensees or Persons Operating Illegally-

All complaints about the unlicensed practice of dentistry, or against licensed dental professionals, whether auxiliaries or dentists, are handled by the

FAQ's

1.Does the dentist have to see the patient before an auxiliary performs any procedure?

Section 1684.5 of the Business and Professions Code, which specifies that it is unprofessional conduct for a dentist to allow any treatment to be performed on a patient who is not a patient of record of that dentist, which is defined as a patient who has been examined, has had a medical and dental history completed and evaluated, and has had oral conditions diagnosed and a written plan developed by the licensed dentist. Section 1684.5 provides several exceptions, which are that a dentist may, after conducting a preliminary oral exam, permit a dental auxiliary to perform allowable procedures necessary for diagnostic purposes, or to perform the following prior to the dentist's examination:

Patient of Record

*Exceptions: After "preliminary" exam DDS can permit auxiliary w/in authorized scope of practice to perform procedures for diagnostic purposes

- Expose emergency x-rays
- Extra oral duties or functions as assigned
- Perform mouth mirror inspection to include charting of obvious lesions, malocclusions, existing restorations & missing teeth

2. Do licenses have to be posted in the office?

There is no requirement in law that actual licenses be posted. However, Business and Professions Code Section 1700 provides that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to disciplinary action if any person "engages in the practice of dentistry without causing to be displayed in a conspicuous place in his or her office the name of each and every person employed there in the practice of dentistry."

3. Do dental personnel have to wear nametags?

Must wear name tag, 18 point font with name and license status Tricia Osuna, RDH, BS Registered Dental Hygienist

4. Do auxiliary duties have to be posted in the office?

 Regulation section 1068 requires that dental auxiliary duties be posted in a common area of the office

5. What does the law require that I do ill know or suspect that a child who has come to the office has been abused?

Section 11166 of the Penal Code requires any health practitioner, which includes dental auxiliaries, who has knowledge of, or observes, a child in his or her professional capacity or within the scope of his or her employment whom he or she knows or reasonably suspects has been the victim of child abuse to report the instance to a child protective agency immediately, or as soon as practically possible.

What About the Safety of Filling Materials?

Patient health and the safety of dental treatments are the primary goals of California's dental professionals and the Dental Board of California. The purpose of this fact sheet is to provide you with information concerning the risks and benefits of all the dental materials used in the restoration (filling) of teeth.

The Dental Board of California is required by law* to make this dental materials fact sheet available to every licensed dentist in the state of California. Your dentist, in turn, must provide this fact sheet to every new patient and all patients of record only once before beginning any dental filling procedure.

As the patient or parent/guardian, you are strongly encouraged to discuss with your dentist the facts presented concerning the filling materials being considered for your particular treatment.

Allergic Reactions to Dental Materials

Components in dental fillings may have side effects or cause allergic reactions, just like other materials we may come in contact with in our daily lives. The risks of such reactions are very low for all types of filling materials. Such reactions can be caused by specific components of the filling materials such as mercury, nickel, chromium, and/or beryllium alloys. Usually, an allergy will reveal itself as a skin rash and is easily reversed when the individual is not in contact with the material.

There are no documented cases of allergic reactions to composite resin, glass ionomer, resin ionomer, or porcelain. However, there have been rare allergic responses reported with dental amalgam, porcelain fused to metal, gold alloys, and nickel or cobalt-chrome alloys.

If you suffer from allergies, discuss these potential problems with your dentist before a filling material is chosen.

Toxicity of Dental Materials

Dental Amalgam

Mercury in its elemental form is on the State of California's Proposition 65 list of chemicals known to the state to cause reproductive toxicity. Mercury may harm the developing brain of a child or fetus.

Dental amalgam is created by mixing elemental mercury (43-54%) and an alloy powder (46-57%) composed mainly of silver, tin, and copper. This has caused discussion about the risks of mercury in dental amalgam. Such mercury is emitted in minute amounts as vapor. Some concerns have been raised regarding possible toxicity. Scientific research continues on the safety of dental amalgam. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, there is scant evidence that the health of the vast majority of people with amalgam is compromised.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and other public health organizations have investigated the safety of amalgam used in dental fillings. The conclusion: no valid scientific evidence has shown that amalgams cause harm to patients with dental restorations, except in rare cases of allergy. The World Health Organization reached a similar conclusion stating, "Amalgam restorations are safe and cost effective."

A diversity of opinions exists regarding the safety of dental amalgams. Questions have been raised about its safety in pregnant women, children, and diabetics. However, scientific evidence and research literature in peer-reviewed scientific journals suggest that otherwise healthy women, children, and diabetics are not at an increased risk from dental amalgams in their mouths. The FDA places no restrictions on the use of dental amalgam.

Composite Resin

Some Composite Resins include Crystalline Silica, which is on the State of California's Proposition 65 list of chemicals known to the state to cause cancer.

It is always a good idea to discuss any dental treatment thoroughly with your dentist.

Dental Materials – Advantages & Disadvantages

DENTAL AMALGAM FILLINGS

Dental amalgam is a self-hardening mixture of silver-tin-copper alloy powder and liquid mercury and is sometimes referred to as silver fillings because of its color. It is often used as a filling material and replacement for broken teeth.

Advantages

- Durable; long lasting
- Wears well; holds up well to the forces of biting
- Relatively inexpensive
- Generally completed in one visit
- Self-sealing; minimal-to-no shrinkage and resists leakage
- Resistance to further decay is high, but can be difficult to find in early stages
- Frequency of repair and replacement is low

Disadvantages

- Refer to "What About the Safety of Filling Materials"
- · Gray colored, not tooth colored
- May darken as it corrodes; may stain teeth over time
- Requires removal of some healthy tooth
- In larger amalgam fillings, the remaining tooth may weaken and fracture
- Because metal can conduct hot and cold temperatures, there may be a temporary sensitivity to hot and cold.
- Contact with other metals may cause occasional, minute electrical flow

The durability of any dental restoration is influenced not only by the material it is made from but also by the dentist's technique when placing the restoration. Other factors include the supporting materials used in the procedure and the patient's cooperation during the procedure. The length of time a restoration will last is dependent upon your dental hygiene, home care, and diet and chewing habits.

COMPOSITE RESIN FILLINGS

Composite fillings are a mixture of powdered glass and plastic resin, sometimes referred to as white, plastic, or tooth-colored fillings. It is used for fillings, inlays, veneers, partial and complete crowns, or to repair portions of broken teeth.

Advantages

- Strong and durable
- Tooth colored
- Single visit for fillings
- Resists breaking
- Maximum amount of tooth preserved
- Small risk of leakage if bonded only to enamel
- Does not corrode
- Generally holds up well to the forces of biting depending on product used
- Resistance to further decay is moderate and easy to find
- Frequency of repair or replacement is low to moderate

Disadvantages

- Refer to "What About the Safety of Filling Materials"
- Moderate occurrence of tooth sensitivity; sensitive to dentist's method of application
- Costs more than dental amalgam
- Material shrinks when hardened and could lead to further decay and/or temperature sensitivity
- Requires more than one visit for inlays, veneers, and crowns
- May wear faster than dental enamel
- May leak over time when bonded beneath the layer of enamel

Dental Materials - Advantages & Disadvantages

GLASS IONOMER CEMENT

Glass ionomer cement is a selfhardening mixture of glass and organic acid. It is tooth-colored and varies in translucency. Glass ionomer is usually used for small fillings, cementing metal and porcelain/metal crowns, liners, and temporary restorations.

Advantages

- Reasonably good esthetics
- May provide some help against decay because it releases fluoride
- Minimal amount of tooth needs to be removed and it bonds well to both the enamel and the dentin beneath the enamel
- Material has low incidence of producing tooth sensitivity
- Usually completed in one dental visit

Disadvantages

- Cost is very similar to composite resin (which costs more than amalgam)
- Limited use because it is not recommended for biting surfaces in permanent teeth
- As it ages, this material may become rough and could increase the accumulation of plaque and chance of periodontal disease
- Does not wear well; tends to crack over time and can be dislodged

RESIN-IONOMER CEMENT

Resin ionomer cement is a mixture of glass and resin polymer and organic acid that hardens with exposure to a blue light used in the dental office. It is tooth colored but more translucent than glass ionomer cement. It is most often used for small fillings, cementing metal and porcelain metal crowns and liners.

Advantages

- Very good esthetics
- May provide some help against decay because it releases fluoride
- Minimal amount of tooth needs to be removed and it bonds well to both the enamel and the dentin beneath the enamel
- Good for non-biting surfaces
- May be used for short-term primary teeth restorations
- May hold up better than glass ionomer but not as well as composite
- Good resistance to leakage
- Material has low incidence of producing tooth sensitivity
- Usually completed in one dental visit

Disadvantages

- Cost is very similar to composite resin (which costs more than amalgam)
- Limited use because it is not recommended to restore the biting surfaces of adults
- Wears faster than composite and amalgam

PORCELAIN (CERAMIC)

Porcelain is a glass-like material formed into fillings or crowns using models of the prepared teeth. The material is toothcolored and is used in inlays, veneers, crowns and fixed bridges.

Advantages

- Very little tooth needs to be removed for use as a veneer; more tooth needs to be removed for a crown because its strength is related to its bulk (size)
- Good resistance to further decay if the restoration fits well
- Is resistant to surface wear but can cause some wear on opposing teeth
- Resists leakage because it can be shaped for a very accurate fit
- The material does not cause tooth sensitivity

Disadvantages

- Material is brittle and can break under biting forces
- May not be recommended for molar teeth
- Higher cost because it requires at least two office visits and laboratory services

NICKEL OR COBALT-CHROME ALLOYS

Nickel or cobalt-chrome alloys are mixtures of nickel and chromium. They are a dark silver metal color and are used for crowns and fixed bridges and most partial denture frameworks.

Advantages

- Good resistance to further decay if the restoration fits
- Excellent durability; does not fracture under stress
- Does not corrode in the mouth
- Minimal amount of tooth needs to be removed
- Resists leakage because it can be shaped for a very accurate fit

Disadvantages

- Is not tooth colored; alloy is a dark silver metal color
- Conducts heat and cold; may irritate sensitive teeth
- Can be abrasive to opposing teeth
- High cost; requires at least two office visits and laboratory services
- Slightly higher wear to opposing teeth

Dental Materials – Advantages & Disadvantages

PORCELAIN FUSED TO METAL

This type of porcelain is a glasslike material that is "enameled" on top of metal shells. It is toothcolored and is used for crowns and fixed bridges

Advantages

- Good resistance to further decay if the restoration fits well
- Very durable, due to metal substructure
- The material does not cause tooth sensitivity
- Resists leakage because it can be shaped for a very accurate fit

Disadvantages

- More tooth must be removed (than for porcelain) for the metal substructure
- Higher cost because it requires at least two office visits and laboratory services

GOLD ALLOY

Gold alloy is a gold-colored mixture of gold, copper, and other metals and is used mainly for crowns and fixed bridges and some partial denture frameworks

Advantages

- Good resistance to further decay if the restoration fits well
- Excellent durability; does not fracture under stress
- Does not corrode in the mouth
- Minimal amount of tooth needs to be removed
- Wears well; does not cause excessive wear to opposing teeth
- Resists leakage because it can be shaped for a very accurate fit

Disadvantages

- Is not tooth colored; alloy is yellow
- Conducts heat and cold; may irritate sensitive teeth
- High cost; requires at least two office visits and laboratory services

The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) requires all health plans, including ERISA, health care clearinghouses and any dentist who transmits health information in an electronic transaction, to use a standard format. Those plans and providers that choose not to use the electronic standards can use a clearinghouse to comply with the requirement. Providers' paper transactions are not subject to this requirement.

HIPAA Privacy and HIPAA Security address two distinct parts of HIPAA, which impose separate regulatory requirements. Your approach to HIPAA Security, including how you staff compliance efforts, may vary greatly from how you handled HIPAA Privacy.

The task of security implementation can seem overwhelming at first, especially when reading the kit for the first time. Although the ADA strongly recommends that the practice owner read the whole Kit, or otherwise have a basic understanding of HIPAA Security, it is best to avoid reading the whole Kit from

cover to cover at one time. Instead, read the Introduction, all of Chapter 1, and pages 19–35 of Chapter 2. These passages contain the keys to the rest of the text. Specifically, the guidance confirms that soundproofing of dental offices is not required, the privacy official may also be the office manager, the training requirement can be met by providing each new employee with a copy of its privacy policy and documenting that the policies have been reviewed, appointment reminder postcards are not a violation, patients can be greeted by name in the waiting room and free toothbrushes are not marketing. As the ADA and other health care providers requested, appropriate changes to the Privacy Rule will be issued later this year. The ADA will comment on those changes as it has with previous proposed rules concerning privacy of protected health information. Policy Statement On Bloodborne Pathogens, Infection Control and The Practice Of Dentistry

As adopted by the ADA House of Delegates October, 1999 and amended October, 2004

Introduction

The dental office is a safe place to provide and receive dental care. Current and generally accepted epidemiological information supports the conclusion that there is no significant risk of contracting bloodborne diseases through the provision of dental treatment when appropriate infection control procedures are followed.

The dental profession in the United States has a long tradition of providing appropriate and compassionate care to the public, including individuals with special needs. The American Dental Association (ADA) believes that it has the responsibility to articulate a clear position on issues related to bloodborne pathogens and diseases and to formulate policy based on current and generally accepted scientific knowledge and accepted moral, ethical and legal imperatives.

This policy statement, addressing bloodborne pathogens, infection control and the practice of dentistry, will be reviewed on a regular basis and may be modified as scientific knowledge of bloodborne pathogen transmission and prevention in heath care settings evolves. The Association urges dentists, other dental workers who may participate or assist in dental procedures, and dental laboratories to follow all ADA policies that deal with bloodborne pathogens.

A key element of infection control is the concept of *standard precautions*, introduced by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as a means to reduce the risk of bloodborne pathogen transmission (e.g., the Human Immunodeficiency Virus [HIV], Hepatitis B Virus [HBV] and others) in healthcare settings. The primary principle behind standard precautions centers on the premise that medical history and examination cannot reliably identify all patients infected with bloodborne pathogens. All patients, therefore, must be regarded as potentially infectious. As such, applying standard precautions requires that infection control procedures (e.g., HBV vaccination, routine handwashing, use of protective barriers and care in the use and disposal of needles and other sharp

instruments) are used for every patient.

Most studies suggest that the prevalence of HCV infection among dentists is similar to that among the general population. Furthermore data historically indicate a higher HBV seroprevalence rate among dentists than the general population, however, declining overall seroprevalence rates and significantly lower rates among dentists under age 40 reaffirm the safety and efficacy of currently recommended infection control measures with respect to bloodborne pathogens. The dental profession, therefore, is strongly urged to continue to adhere to current infection control recommendations as set forth by the ADA and the CDC.

Since the implementation of standard precautions in the United States as a main element of infection control, and with the exception of the Florida case-cluster where HIV may have been transmitted from a dentist to six patients, there have been no documented cases of HIV transmission from dentist to patient, patient to dentist, or patient to patient as a result of dental treatment. Similarly, since 1987 and the implementation of standard precautions, there have been no documented outbreaks of HBV or HCV associated with the practice of dentistry.

Patient Issues

Infection Control: Patients infected with bloodborne pathogens can be safely treated in the private dental office. Current epidemiological evidence indicates that there is no significant risk of contracting bloodborne diseases through the provision of dental treatment when standard precautions are routinely followed. The practice of standard precautions is an effective means of reducing blood contacts that can result in bloodborne pathogen transmission, minimizing even further the already low risk of disease transmission in the dental office.

Vaccination: The Association urges dentists and other dental workers who may be at reasonable risk for infection to take advantage of the hepatitis B vaccine, and other vaccines, to protect themselves and patients from infectious organisms. In addition, the Association supports having all dental, advanced dental and allied dental education programs encourage the vaccination of students, faculty and staff against infectious organisms.

Referral for Medical Evaluation: Dentists should be alert to signs and symptoms of bloodborne disease that may be identified during the provision of dental care. Patients with medical histories or conditions possibly indicative of infection should be referred to their physicians for diagnostic procedures, counseling and medical follow-up.

Patient Disclosure: The Association believes that all patients infected with a bloodborne pathogen(s) should disclose their bloodborne pathogen status as part of their medical history; dentists, like physicians, need to know every patient's medical history in order to make appropriate treatment decisions that are in the best interests of the patient.

Access to Care: The Association believes that individuals infected with a bloodborne pathogen(s) should be treated with compassion and dignity and should

have access to dental treatment. Treatment considerations should be based on current and generally accepted scientific knowledge. A dentist should not refuse to provide oral health care that is within the dentist's current realm of competence solely because the patient is infected with a bloodborne pathogen.

Furthermore, the ADA's *Principles of Ethics and Code of Professional Conduct* states that a dentist has the general obligation to provide care to those in need. A decision not to provide treatment to an individual based solely on the fact that the individual is infected with a bloodborne pathogen is unethical.

Professional Judgment: The ADA supports the right and responsibility of each dentist to exercise his or her best professional judgment, based on current and generally accepted scientific knowledge and the ethics of the profession, in all situations regarding when and how to treat and whether to refer each patient.

Exposure Incidents: The Association recommends that dentists be familiar with current CDC postexposure protocols for the management of occupational exposures to bloodborne pathogens and that dentists institute office policies to ensure appropriate and efficient management of exposure incidents. The ADA recommends that the costs associated with postexposure prophylaxis and exposure sequelae be a benefit of Workers' Compensation insurance coverage.

Confidentiality: The Association urges dentists to maintain strict confidentiality of a patient's bloodborne pathogen status and medical condition. Under the Association's *Principles of Ethics and Code of Professional Conduct*, dentists are ethically obligated to safeguard the confidentiality of patient records and to maintain patient records in a manner consistent with the protection of the welfare of the patient. This does not prevent dentists from sharing information about the patient's bloodborne pathogen status and medical condition with the patient's other health care providers when allowed by state or federal law. Dentists are encouraged to have an office protocol, in accordance with applicable laws, for the confidential handling of information about patients infected with a bloodborne pathogen(s).

Provider Issues

Practice Restrictions/Disclosure: The ADA affirms that dentists infected with bloodborne pathogens can safely provide dental care, and that bloodborne pathogen infection alone does not justify the limiting of professional duties or automatically mandate disclosure provided proper infection control procedures are implemented. Infected dental health care workers must practice in compliance with CDC or equivalent infection-control recommendations, as required by applicable law.

If the government mandates testing for bloodborne pathogen infection and disclosure for health care workers who test positive, the ADA Council on Government Affairs will investigate and pursue national legislative possibilities of a government-sponsored insurance program that would guarantee reasonable financial compensation to health care workers who may be discriminated against upon disclosure of their disease status.

Infection Control: Current epidemiological evidence indicates that there is no significant risk of contracting bloodborne diseases through the provision of dental treatment when standard precautions and recommended infection control procedures are routinely followed. Practicing standard precautions is an effective means of reducing blood contacts that can result in bloodborne pathogen transmission, minimizing even further the already low risk of disease transmission in the dental office.

However, because the foremost concern of the dental profession must continue to be protection of the patient, the Association strongly encourages all dental health care workers to undergo personal evaluation and assess their need to determine their bloodborne pathogen status. Furthermore, dental health care workers who believe they are at risk for bloodborne pathogen infection should regularly monitor their status. All dental health care workers testing positive for a bloodborne pathogen must practice only in strict compliance with the current infection-control recommendations of the CDC for infected providers or their equivalent, as required by applicable law; this includes submitting to, and adhering to any objective and appropriate restrictions imposed by expert review panels with competent jurisdiction, as outlined by the CDC.

The high ethical standards of the dental profession establish the welfare of the patient as the dentist's primary ethical obligation. The Association's Council on Ethics, Bylaws and Judicial Affairs has stated in an advisory opinion to the ADA *Principles of Ethics and Code of Professional Conduct* that a dentist who contracts any disease or becomes impaired in any way that might endanger patients or dental staff shall, with consultation and advice from a qualified physician or other authority, limit the activities of practice to those areas that do not endanger patients or other health care providers.

Exposure Incidents: The Association's *Principles of Ethics and Code of* Professional Conduct requires that all dentists, regardless of their known bloodborne pathogen status, have an ethical obligation to immediately inform any patient they suspect may have been exposed to blood or other potentially infectious material in the dental office of the need for postexposure evaluation and follow-up and to refer the patient, as needed, to a qualified healthcare practitioner who can provide postexposure services. The dentist's ethical obligation in the event of an exposure incident extends to providing information concerning the dentist's own bloodborne pathogen status to the evaluating health care practitioner, if the dentist is the source individual, and submitting to testing that will assist in the evaluation of the patient. If a staff member or other third person is the source individual, the dentist should encourage that person to cooperate as needed for the patient's evaluation. Dentists should document in the patient's record the actions they have taken in response to a patient's exposure to blood or other potentially infectious material. Care should be taken not to include in the patient record confidential medical information about the dentist or a staff member, to avoid unauthorized disclosure of this information with the patient record.

Insurance Coverage: If a dentist infected with a bloodborne pathogen discontinues the practice of dentistry because of a legal requirement to disclose his/her bloodborne pathogen status to patients, the Association believes the dentist to be totally disabled with respect to the practice of dentistry. The ADA will assist

and support infected dentists in sustaining meaningful professional careers and will encourage insurance carriers to provide disability benefits for such dentists.

Education

Public Information and Education: Appropriate agencies of the Association should continue efforts to educate the public about both the efficacy of standard precautions and the absence of a significant epidemiological risk of contracting bloodborne diseases through the provision of dental treatment when recommended infection control procedures are routinely followed.

The healthcare and communications communities also should work together, in consultation with government agencies, to develop public service announcements and other educational messages regarding bloodborne diseases. Public education to increase awareness of how bloodborne diseases are transmitted should include information aimed at diminishing irrational fears about transmission of such diseases through dental treatment.

Professional Education: The *Principles of Ethics and Code of Professional Conduct* of the ADA states that the privilege of dentists to be accorded professional status rests primarily in the knowledge, skill and experience with which they serve their patients and society. All dentists, therefore, have the obligation of keeping their knowledge and skill current.

The Association recommends the development of national educational programs for the dental team that address infection control recommendations for preventing bloodborne pathogen transmission in health care settings as well as programs that address the management of the oral and systemic implications of bloodborne diseases. The Association further recommends that dental schools, dental auxiliary schools and advanced dental education programs incorporate these programs in curriculum content and clinical activities. The Association will further assist the profession in addressing bloodborne disease issues by assuring the widespread dissemination of current infection-control recommendations and information on bloodborne diseases to the dental community through Association publications, conferences and videotapes.

Legal and Legislative Issues

Antidiscrimination: The ADA supports clarifying or amending antidiscrimination laws and regulations, either legislatively or through the courts, in consideration of the rights of the patient to be free from acts of prejudice and the rights of others to be protected against an unreasonable risk of disease.

The Association also strongly supports state and federal legislation that protects a dentist from charges of discrimination if a dentist, in a sincere effort to protect a patient's health, elects to refrain from performing a dental procedure on a patient who fails to disclose medical information that, in the dentist's professional judgment and based on current and generally accepted scientific knowledge, may significantly impact the patient's treatment. The Association further strongly supports state and federal legislation that gives an infected patient's health care providers the right to share, when medically indicated, knowledge of the patient's

bloodborne pathogen status and current medical condition without risking a violation of state or federal antidiscrimination laws and confidentiality laws.

Professional Judgment: The Association, where appropriate, will pursue legal and legislative means to effect changes to existing statutes, regulations, guidelines and interpretations which impose inappropriate restraint on the exercise of the dentist's professional judgment in the treatment of persons with disabilities and/or infectious diseases.

Classification of Bloodborne Pathogens: The ADA supports the classification of bloodborne pathogens as infectious and communicable disease agents and, as such, will take every appropriate opportunity to publicly support such classification.

National Policies: The Association supports initiatives to develop national policies on bloodborne disease/infection that can become the basis for coordinated efforts by the public and private sectors. The oral health aspects of bloodborne disease/infection and issues related to the practice of dentistry should be included in national policies.

Mandatory Testing: The ADA opposes any laws or regulations that require mandatory testing of dentists and other health care workers to determine their bloodborne pathogen status.

Enforcement of Infection Control Guidelines: Enforcement of CDC or equivalent infection-control guidelines should be assigned to state boards of dentistry.

Statement on Infection Control Standards of Care and Compliance: The ADA encourages and supports infection control standards of care, provided those standards are based on and justified by scientific research, and advocates and pursues fair systems of compliance as well as appropriate penalties for noncompliance.

California Dental Practice Act Code of Regulations

Amend Section 1005 of Division 10 Title 16 of the California Code of Regulations to read as follows:

- (a) Definitions of terms used in this section:
- (1) "Standard precautions" is a set of combined precautions that include the major components of universal precautions (designed to reduce the risk of transmission of blood borne pathogens) and body substance isolation (designed to reduce the risk of transmission of pathogens from moist body substances). Similar to universal precautions, standard precautions are used for care of all patients regardless of their diagnoses or personal infectious status.
- (2) "Critical instruments" are surgical and other instruments used to penetrate soft tissue or bone.
- (3) "Semi-critical instruments" are surgical and other instruments that are not used to penetrate soft tissue or bone, but contact oral tissue.
- (4) "Non-critical instruments and devices" are instruments and devices that contact intact skin.
- (5) "Low-level disinfection" is the least effective disinfection process., kills some bacteria, viruses and fungi, but does not kill bacterial spores or mycobacterium tuberculosis var bovis, a laboratory test organism used to classify the strength of disinfectant chemicals.
- (6) "Intermediate-level disinfection" kills mycobacterium tuberculosis var bovis indicating that many human pathogens are also killed, but does not necessarily kill spores.
- (7) "High-level disinfection" kills some, but not necessarily all bacterial spores. This process kills mycobacterium tuberculosis var bovis, bacteria, fungi, and viruses.
- (8) All germicides must be used in accordance with intended use and label instructions.
- (9) "Sterilization" kills all forms of microbial life.
- (10) "Personal Protective Equipment" includes items such as gloves, masks, protective eyewear and protective attire (gowns/labcoats) which are intended to prevent exposure to blood and body fluids.
- (11) "Other Potentially Infectious Materials" (OPIM) means any one of the following:
 - (A) human body fluids such as saliva in dental procedures and any body fluid that is visibly contaminated with blood, and all body fluids in situations where it is difficult or impossible to differentiate between body fluids:
 - (B) any unfixed tissue or organ (other than intact skin) from a human (living or dead);
 - (C) HIV-containing cell or tissue cultures, organ culture and blood, or other tissues from experimental animals.
- (b) Licensees shall comply with infection control precautions mandated by the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (Cal-DOSH)
- (c) All licensees shall comply with and enforce the following minimum precautions to minimize the transmission of pathogens in health care settings:

- (1) Standard precautions shall be practiced in the care of all patients.
- (2) A written protocol shall be developed by the licensee for proper instrument processing, operatory cleanliness, and management of injuries.
- (3) A copy of this regulation shall be conspicuously posted in each dental office.

Personal Protective Equipment

- (4) Health care workers shall wear surgical facemasks in combination with either chin length plastic face shields or protective eyewear when treating patients whenever there is potential for splashing or spattering of blood or OPIM. After each patient, and during patient treatment if applicable, masks shall be changed if moist or contaminated. After each patient, face shields and protective eyewear shall be cleaned and disinfected, if contaminated.
- (5) Health care workers shall wear reusable or disposable protective attire when their clothing or skin is likely to be soiled with blood or OPIM. Gowns must be changed daily or between patients if it should become moist or visibly soiled. Protective attire must be removed when leaving laboratories or areas of patient care activities. Reusable gowns shall be laundered in accordance with Cal-DOSH Bloodborne Pathogens Standards, (Title 8, Cal. Code of Regs., section 5193).

Hand Hygiene:

- (6) Health care workers shall wash contaminated or visibly soiled hands with soap and water and put on new gloves before treating each patient. If hands are not visibly soiled or contaminated an alcohol based hand rub may be used as an alternative to soap and water.
- (7) Healthcare workers who have exudative lesions or weeping dermatitis of the hand shall refrain from all direct patient care and from handling patient care equipment until the condition resolves.

Gloves:

(8) Medical exam gloves shall be worn whenever there is a potential for contact with mucous membranes, blood or OPIM. Gloves must be discarded upon completion of treatment and before leaving laboratories or areas of patient care activities. Healthcare workers shall perform hand hygiene procedures after removing and discarding gloves. Gloves shall not be washed before or after use.

Sterilization and Disinfection:

- (9) Heat stable critical and semi-critical instruments shall be cleaned and sterilized before use by using steam under pressure (autoclaving), dry heat, or chemical vapor. FDA cleared chemical sterilants/disinfectants shall be used for sterilization of heat-sensitive critical items and for high level disinfection of heat-sensitive semi-critical items
- (10) Critical and semi-critical instruments or containers of critical and semi-critical instruments sterilized by a heat or vapor method shall be packaged or wrapped before sterilization if they are not to be used immediately after being sterilized. These packages or containers shall remain sealed unless the instruments within them are placed onto a setup tray and covered with a moisture impervious barrier on the day the instruments will be used and shall be stored in a manner so as to prevent contamination.
- (11) All high-speed dental hand pieces, low-speed hand piece components used intraorally, and other dental unit attachments such as reusable air/water syringe tips and ultrasonic scaler tips, shall be heat-sterilized between patients.
- (12) Single use disposable instruments (e.g. prophylaxis angles, prophylaxis cups and brushes, 3 tips for high-speed evacuators, saliva ejectors, air/water syringe tips) shall be used for one patient only and discarded.

- (13) Needles shall be recapped only by using the scoop technique or a protective device. Needles shall not be bent or broken for the purpose of disposal. Disposable needles, syringes, scalpel blades or other sharp items and instruments shall be placed into sharps containers for disposal according to all applicable regulations.
- (14) Proper functioning of the sterilization cycle shall be verified at least weekly through the use of a biological indicator (such as a spore test). Test results must be maintained for 12 months.

Irrigation:

(15) Sterile coolants/irrigants shall be used for surgical procedures involving soft tissue or bone. Sterile coolants/irrigants must be delivered using a sterile delivery system.

Facilities:

- (16) If items or surfaces likely to be contaminated are difficult to clean and disinfect they shall be protected with disposable impervious barriers.
- (17) Clean and disinfect all clinical contact surfaces that are not protected by impervious barriers using a Cal-EPA registered, hospital grade low- to intermediate-level disinfectant after each patient. The low-level disinfectants used shall be labeled effective against HBV and HIV. Use disinfectants in accordance with the manufacturers instructions. Clean all housekeeping surfaces (e.g. floors, walls, sinks) with a detergent and water or a Cal-EPA registered, hospital grade disinfectant.
- (18) Dental unit water lines shall be anti-retractive. At the beginning of each workday, dental unit lines shall be purged with air, or flushed with water for at least two (2) minutes prior to attaching handpieces, scalers and other devices. The dental unit line shall be flushed between each patient for a minimum of twenty (20) seconds.
- (19) Contaminated solid waste shall be disposed of according to applicable local, state, and federal environmental standards.

Lab Areas:

- (20) Splash shields and equipment guards shall be used on dental laboratory lathes. Fresh pumice and a disinfected, sterilized, or new ragwheel shall be used for each patient. Devices used to polish, trim or adjust contaminated intraoral devices shall be disinfected or sterilized.
- (21) Intraoral items such as impressions, bite registrations, prosthetic and orthodontic appliances shall be cleaned and disinfected with an intermediate-level disinfectant before manipulation in the laboratory and before placement in the patient's mouth. Such items shall be thoroughly rinsed prior to placement in the patient's mouth.
- (d) The Board shall review this regulation annually

- 100 compressions per minute hard and fast with full chest recoil
- Press down the chest 1 ½" to 2" deep with each compression
- Two 1 second breaths enough to make chest rise
- Respiratory Arrest 1 breath every 5 to 6 seconds.
- AED: use immediately if witnessed arrest or 2 minutes of CPR (5 cycles) if un-witnessed arrest. (shock if indicated then 2 minutes of CPR repeat)

* Adult/Child choking (unable to speak or weak cough)

- Heimlich Maneuver until relieved
- If unconscious treat with CPR/ checking inside mouth prior to breath

Child:

- **30:2** Compressions to ventilation ratio **1 rescuer**
- 15:2 Compressions to ventilation ratio 2 rescuer
- 100 compressions per minute hard and fast with full chest recoil
- Press down the chest 1/3 to 1/2 the depth of the chest with each compression
- Two 1 second breaths enough to make chest rise
- Respiratory Arrest 1 breath every 3 to 5 seconds.
- AED: use immediately if witnessed arrest or 2 minutes of CPR (5 cycles) if un-witnessed arrest. (shock if indicated then 2 minutes of CPR repeat)

Infant:

- **30:2** Compressions to ventilation ratio **1 rescuer**
- 15:2 Compressions to ventilation ratio 2 rescuer
- 100 compressions per minute hard and fast with full chest recoil
- Press down the chest 1/3 to 1/2 the depth of the chest with each compression
- Two 1 second breaths enough to make chest rise
- Respiratory Arrest 1 breath every 3 to 5 seconds.
- AED: Not indicated for infants birth to 1 year

* Choking Infant (weak cry or cough)

- 5 back slaps followed by 5 chest thrusts
- If unconscious treat with CPR/ checking inside mouth prior to breath

New State Law Changes Requirements for Controlled Substance Prescription Forms

 Effective July 1, 2004, a new law eliminates the triplicate prescription requirement for Schedule II controlled substances and, on and after Jan.1, 2005, Schedule II controlled substances prescribers are required to meet the same prescription requirements imposed on other prescribable controlled substances.

- Effective Jan.1, 2005, prescriptions for any controlled substance must be issued on controlled substance prescription forms obtained from a security printer approved by the Board of Pharmacy. (The tamper-resistant prescription form)
- Every practitioner who prescribes a controlled substance classified in Schedule II must make a record that shows all of the following:
 - 1. Name and address of patient
 - 2. Date
 - 3. Name, strength and quantity of the controlled substances
- The prescriber's record must show the pathology and purpose for which the controlled substance is prescribed. for each prescription for a Schedule II controlled substance dispensed, the prescriber must record and maintain the following:
 - 1. Full name, address, gender, and date of birth of the patient
 - The prescriber's license number, federal controlled substance registration number, and the state medical license number of any prescriber using the federal controlled substance registration number of a government-exempt facility
 - 3. Pharmacy prescription number, license number, and federal controlled substance registration number
 - 4. National Drug Code number of the controlled substance dispensed
 - 5. Quantity of the controlled substance dispensed
 - 6. ICD-9 (diagnosis code), if available
 - 7. Date of dispensing of the prescription

All controlled substance prescriptions are valid for six months. This eliminates a 14-day limit for Schedule IIs. Each prescriber who dispenses controlled substances must provide the Department of Justice with the information required by this law on a monthly basis in either hard copy or electronic form.

SITUATIONS AND THE APPROPRIATE MEDICATIONS TO BE USED

Note: In California (and possibly other states, check your state law), to give oral sedation to a child under 13 years old requires a special oral sedation permit from the State Board of Dental Examiners. Oral sedation means anything given by mouth that will sedate or relax the child. This would include sedative/hypnotics (barbiturates, benzodiazepines), antihistamines, narcotics and chloral hydrate.

MEDICATIONS:

Valium Ativan Xanax Vistaril

1) Anxiety/Sedation

Rx Valium 5 mg

Disp. 4 tablets

Sig. Take I tablet in evening before going to bed and I tablet I hour before your appointment. *Caution*:

- Patient should not drive themselves to or from the appointment.
- Do not prescribe to pregnant women.

Ingredient: Diazepam

Rx Ativan I mg

Disp. 8 tablets

Sig. Take 2 tablets in evening before going to bed and take 2 tablets I hour before your appointment.

Caution: (As for Valium) **Ingredient**: Lorazepam

Rx Xanax 0.5 mg

Disp. 4 tablets

Sig. Take I tablet in evening before going to bed and take

Rx Vistaril 25 mg

Disp. 8 capsules

Sig. Take 2 tablets in the evening before going to bed and 2 tablets I hour before appointment.

Note: Children's dosage is I tablet before bed and I tablet before appointment. **Ingredient**: Hydroxyzine

♦ MEDICATIONS: PAIN - MILD

Available over-the-counter (OTC)

(Non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAID) used as analgesics)

Rx Aspirin 325 mg (OTC)

Disp

Sig 2 to 3 tablets every four hours

Note: See Note under Ibuprofen. It applies to all NSAIDS including aspirin

Rx Ibuprofen 200 mg (OTC)

Disp

Sig 2 to 4 tablets every four hours, up to 16 tablets (3200 mg) per day.

Note 1: Ibuprofen is available over-the-counter as Motrin, Advil, Nuprin, and many other brands in 200 mg tablets.

Note 2: a) NSAIDs should never be taken together, nor should they be combined with aspirin.

NSAIDs have anti-inflammatory effects as well as producing analgesia.

- b) An allergy to aspirin constitutes a contraindication to all the new NSAIDs.
- c) Aspirin and the NSAIDs, except Vioxx, may increase post-treatment bleeding.

Rx Aleve (OTC)

Disp

Sig Take 2 tablets to start, then take I tablet every 6 – 12 hours up to 3 tablets (825 mg) per day.

Ingredient: Naproxen Sodium

Note: I) See Note 2 under Ibuprofen. it applies to all NSAIDS

Aleve and Anaprox are the same drug, same tablet size. OTC dosage is lower, duration longer, as per FDA rule.

Rx Ketoprofen 12.5mg (OTC)

Disp

Sig Take 2 caplets to start, then I caplet every 4 - 6 hours up to 6 caplets per day.

Note: I) Ketoprofen is available over the counter as Orudis KT

- 2) See Note 2 under Ibuprofen. It applies to all NSAIDS
- 3) Orudis is the prescription form of Orudis KT same tablet size.

Rx Acetaminophen 325 mg (OTC)

Disp

Sig Take 2 - 3 tablets every four hours

Products include: Tylenol, Datril, Anacin 3 and many others

Note: Acetaminophen can be given if patient has allergy, bleeding problems, or stomach upset secondary to aspirin or NSAIDs

REQUIRE PRESCRIPTION

Rx* Motrin 800 mg

Disp 28 tablets

Sig Take I tablet three times per day

Ingredient: Ibuprofen

Note: For severe pain Motrin (800 mg) can be given up to four times per day.

Rx* Dolobld 500 mg

Disp 16 tablets

Sig Take 2 tablets initially then I tablet every 8 - 12 hours for pain.

Ingredient. Diflunisal

Rx* Anaprox

Disp 16 tablets

Sig Take 2 tablets to start, then take I tablet every 6 – 8 hours, not to exceed 5 tablets (1375mg) per 24 hrs.

Ingredient. Naproxen Sodium

Note: This is the prescription form of Aleve.

Rx* Vioxx 50 mg

Disp 5 capsules

Sig Take I capsule once per day for up to 5 days.

Ingredient. RofecoxibNote: Do not exceed 5 days.

Rx Celebrex 200 mg

Disp 15 capsules

Sig Take 2 capsules stat, then I capsule every 12 hours.

Ingredient: Celecoxib

Note: Celebrex is a sulfa drug and should not be given to patients allergic to sulfa drugs.

♦ MEDICATIONS: PAIN - MODERATE

• The following is a guideline to use when prescribing codeine with either Aspirin or Acetaminophen (Tylenol):

Codeine No. 2 = Codeine 15 mg

Codeine No. 3 = Codeine 30 mg

Codeine No. 4 = Codeine 60 mg

Sig Take I tablet every four hours for pain

Ingredients: Hydrocodone 5 mg. Acetaminophen 500 mg

Disp 20 tablets

Sig Take I or 2 tablets every 4 hours for pain (Do not exceed 8 tablets in 24 hours)

*Ingredients: Hydrocodone 5 mg, Acetaminophen 500 mg

Rx Percodan

Disp 20 tablets

Sig Take 1-2 tablets every four hours for pain

Ingredients: Oxycodone 4.88 mg, Aspirin 325 mg

*Tamper-resistant prescription required

Rx* Percocet 5/325 mg

Disp 20 tablets

Sig Take 1-2 tablets every four hours for pain

Ingredients: Oxycodone 5 mg, Acetaminophen 325 mg

Note: Percocet comes in 3 strengths: 5, 7.5, and 10 mg of oxycodone per tablet. You

must specify dosage size.

♦ MEDICATIONS: PAIN - SEVERE

Rx* Demerol 50 mg

Disp 16 tablets

Sig Take I tablet every four hours for pain

Ingredients: Meperidine

*Tamper-resistant prescription required

Rx* Dilaudid 2 mg

Disp 16 tablets

Sig Take I tablet every four hours for pain

Ingredients: Hydromorphone

*Tamper-resistant prescription required

◆ MEDICATIONS: PAIN - FOR PATIENTS ALLERGIC TO ASPIRIN AND OPIOIDS

Rx Ultracet

Disp 24 tablet

Sig Take 2 tablets 4x day (do not exceed 8 tablets in 24 hours)

Ingredients: Acetaminophen 325 mg, Tramadol 37.5 mg

^{*}Tamper-resistant prescription required

Azithromycin (Zithromax®)

◆ ANTIBIOTIC DECISION MAKING

Drugs of choice for Dental Infections:

Penicillin or Amoxicillin

If no response in 48-72 hours then use:

A. Clindamycin (best choice)

or

B. Cephalexin or Dicloxacillin

or

C. Some dentists elect to add Metronidazol to the amoxicillin

If no response to choice **B** or **C** in 24-48 hours, then use:

Clindamycin

(Be sure to incise and drain, if appropriate.)

* **Note**: If patient is allergic to penicillin, first drug of choice is: **Erythromycin**If no response in 48-72 hours, then use:

Clindamycin (Some clinicians may elect to start with clindamycin.)

(If no response to above protocol, refer to/consult with an oral surgeon, endodontist or infectious disease physician.)

Rx Amoxicillin 500 mg

Disp 21 tablets

Sig Take I tablet 3 times a day

Rx Augmentin 500 mg

Disp 30 tablets

Sig Take I tablet 3 times a day

Ingredients: Amoxicillin 500 mg, Clavulanate Potassium

Note: Augmentin is a penicillinase protected (by the clavulanate) amoxicillin.

Rx Cephalexin 500 mg

Disp 28 capsules

Sig Take I capsule 4 times a day

Rx Clindamycin I5O mg

Disp 56 capsules

Sig Take 2 capsules every 6 hour

Note: All antibiotics have risk of pseudomembranous colitis, especially clindamycin

Rx Dicloxacillin 500 mg

Disp 28 capsules

Sig Take I capsule every 6 hours

Rx Erythromycin Base 250 mg

Disp 28 (Enteric coated) tablets Sig Take I tablet 4 times a day

Note: Erythromycin has a high risk for drug-drug interactions, especially if used for more than 2 weeks.

Rx Metronidazole 500 mg

Disp 30 tablets

Sig Take I tablet 3 times a day

Rx Penicillin VK 500 mg

Disp 28 tablets

Sig Take I tablet 4 times a day

Rx Zithromax (Z-pak)

Disp I pack (6 x 250 mg tablets)

Sig Take 2 tablets on day I and I tablet on days 2-5.

Ingredient: Azithromycin

4) INFECTION: FUNGAL

Nystatin Oral Suspension Nystatin Tablets Nystatin Ointment or Cream Nystatin Powder Mycelex Nizoral Diflucan

◆ ANTIFUNAGAL DECISION MAKING

Drugs of Choice for Oral Fungal Infections*

- The first drugs of choice for local treatment of oral fungal infection are:
 MycelexTroche or NystatinTablets
- The drug of choice for systematic treatment of oral fungal infections is:
 Nizoral or Diflucan
- The drug of choice for angular cheilitis is:

Mycolog II Cream

*Note: Chlorhexidine has been shown to be of value to control oral fungal infections, especially in HIV infected patients. (Symptomatic patients rinse 2 times per day; asymptomatic patients rinse I time per day at night.)

Rx Mycelex Troche 10 mg

Disp 70 tablets

Sig Dissolve one tablet in mouth S times per day

Ingredient: Clotrimazole

Note: The troche contain sucrose, risk of caries with prolonged use (greater than 3 months).

Rx Nystatin Tablets

Disp 30 troches

Sig Dissolve I tablet in mouth until gone, three times a day

Ingredients: 100,000 units of nystatin per tablet

Special Indications: The soluble tablet is more effective than an oral suspension.

Rx Nizoral 200 m

Disp 10 tablets

Sig Take I tablet per day

Ingredient. Ketoconazol

Note: To be used if candida infection does not respond to Mycostatin.

Note: Potential for liver toxicity. Liver function should be monitored with long term

use (longer than 3 weeks).

Note: Multiple severe drug interactions possible. Check with pharmacist about

interactions,

if patients are taking other medications.

Rx Difiucan 100 mg

Disp 15 tablets

Sig Take 2 tablets the first day and I tablet each day thereafter until resolved.

Ingredient. Fluconazole

Rx Nystatin Oral Suspension

Disp 250 ml

Sig Use I tablespoonful four times a day; rinse and hold in mouth as long as possible

before spitting out.

Ingredients: Nystatin 100,000 units/mi.

Vehicle contains 50% sucrose and not more than 1% alcohol.

Rx Nystatin (Ointment Cream or Powder)(select one)

Disp 15g or 30g tube

Sig Apply liberally to affected areas three times daily

Ingredients: Cream:100,000 units nystatin per gram, aqueous vanishing cream base.

Ointment:100,000 units nystatin per gram, polyethylene and mineral oil gel base.

Powder: 5,000 units nystatin per mg. May be sprinkled into dentures.

5) INFECTION: VIRAL

Herpes Simplex Management

Oral herpes simplex is a viral disease. Secondary attacks occur on lips and, when inside the mouth, attached (overlying bone) mucosa.

PRIMARY ATTACK

Xylocaine 2% viscous_(pallative)

Valacyclovir (Valtrex®)

Fluids and nutrition (liquid food supplements, if needed)

SECONDARY ATTACK

Valacyclovir tablets at first indication of attack.

May supplement with Acyclovir ointment or penciclovir (Denavire) or docosanol (Abreva®) as needed.

PROPHYLAXIS:ACUTE

Valacyclovir tablets, I day prior, day of, and 2 days after precipitating event (i.e. sun exposure, dental visit)

PROPHYLAXIS CHRONIC (for severe cases

Valacyclovir, I tablet 2 times a day for up to 3 years

or

Famciclovir, 250mg, 2 times a day for a year.

*Re-evaluate need yearly by discontinuing drug and observing the patient for recurrence.

Rx Xylocaine 2% Viscous

Disp I00 ml or 450 ml

Sig Use two teaspoons to rinse around oral cavity as needed to relieve pain - spit out. **Ingredient**: Lidocaine HCI

Rx Zovirax 200 mg

Disp 70 capsules

Sig Take I capsule 5 times per day for 2 weeks

Ingredient. Acyclovir

Rx Zovirax Ointment 5%

Disp 15 gm

Sig Apply thin layer to lesion 6 times a day for 7 days.

Ingredient. Acyclovir

Rx Denavir

Disp 2 gm

Sig Apply every 2 hours during waking hours for a period of 4 days.

Ingredient. Penciclovir 1%

Rx Valtrex 500mg

Disp 8 tablets

Sig Take 4 tablets at first sign of attack and then take 4 tablets 12 hours later.

Ingredient: Valacyclovir

Note: Not for HIV patients; may cause thrombocytopenia.

Rx Abreva (OTC)

Disp 2g

Sig Apply to lesion 5 times per day until lesion gone.

Ingredient: docosanol 10%

6) ORAL SOFT TISSUE PROBLEMS

Aphthous: Benadryl/KaopeCtate Lidex in Orabase Kenalog in Orabase Dexamethasone Elixir

Necrotizing Ulcerating Gingivitis: Betadine

Allergy: Benadryl

Oral Inflammatory Disease: Lidex in Orabase Kenalog in Orabase Prednisone DexamethaSone Elixir

Angular Cheilitis: Mycolog II Cream

◆ APHTHOUS ULCERS (CANKER SORES) MANAGEMENT

Aphthous is an autoimmune disease with poorly understood triggering causes. The lesions occur exclusively on unattached (cheek, floor of mouth, etc.) mucosa. (As opposed to secondary herpes simplex, which, intraorally, occurs only on attached mucosa)

Treatment for canker sores is divided into three sections:

Prevention, Pain Relief, and Pharmocological Treatment.

Prevention: Avoid triggering foods: Nuts, chocolate, acidic fruits.

Avoid Trauma: Toothbrush trauma, cheek bite, etc.

Avoid Sodium Lauryl Sulfate: (A soap found in most toothpaste and mouth washes)

Consider Biotene toothpaste or Rembrandt for canker sore sufferers.

Consider an Antimicrobial mouthrinse; Chlorhexidine or Listerine.

• Pain Relief: Products which coat the lesion or numb it or both.

Examples: Coat & Numb:

Orabase B Zilactin B Kanka

Coat Lesion Only:

Orabase Soothe-n-Seal

Liquid Carafate

Ora 5

Benadryl/Kaopectate

Aphthasol®

Pharmacological Treatment: Corticosteroids to reverse the autoimmune process.

(All are by rescription)

Examples:

Kenalog in Orabase

(often not potent enough)

Lidex ointment compounded

50/50 in Orabase

Dexamethasone Elixir

In rare occasions,

Prednisone

40mg/day for 7 days

◆ (ACUTE) NECROTIZING ULCERATING GINGIVITIS (ANUG or NUG)

*NUG is a specific bacterial (spirochetal) infection.

Treatment Steps:

- I) Amoxicillin to treat infection
- 2) Chlorhexidine or Betadine to aid in treating infection
- 3) Hydrogen peroxide rinse and/or warm saline rinse
- 4) Short term pain medication as needed
- 5) Dental cleaning when patient is comfortable.

Rx Betadine solution

Disp 8 OZ.

Sig Rinse I teaspoon in mouth for I minute and spit out, 2 times per day.

Ingredient: Povidone-iodine 10%

Note: Not to be used in patients allergic to iodine.

Solution should be completely spit out. For short term use only, maximum 2 days.

MEDICATIONS: ALLERGY

Rx Benadryl 50 mg

Disp 16 capsules

Sig Three to four times daily

Ingredients: Diphenhydramine Hydrochloride

Special Indications: Use 3 to 4 times per day for four days depending on duration

of allergic reaction

Rx Benadryl Syrup (Mix 50/50) with Kaopectate

Disp 8 oz. total

Sig Rinse I tablespoon in mouth for I minute, as needed to relieve pain or burning, then spit out.

♦ MEDICATIONS: ORAL INFLAMMATORY DISEASE

Rx Lidex Ointment mixed 50/50 with Orabase

Disp 30 gm_total

Sig Apply thin layer to oral lesions 4-6 times daily

Ingredient: Fluocinonide 0.05%

Rx Temovate Ointment

Disp 15 gm

Sig Apply thin layer to oral lesions 4-6 times a day

Ingredient: clobetasol 0.05%

Rx Kenalog in Orabase

Disp 5 gm

Sig Apply thin layer to affected area 3 times per day

Note: If stronger corticosteroid needed use Lidex compounded in Orabase (above).

Rx Dexamethasone Elixir

Disp 500 ml

Sig Rinse I teaspoon in mouth for I minute, 4-5 times per day, then spit out Ingredient: Dexamethasone 0.5 mg/5ml,1.0 mg. triamcinolone acetonide

Rx Prednisone 5 mg

Disp 40 tablets

Sig Take 4 tablets in A.M. and 4 tablets at noon for 5 days.

Caution: I. Take medication with food.

2.Use with extreme caution. This is a potent sytemic dosage. Consult with patients physician, an oral medicine DDS(at dental schools), or medical textbook, if questions on dosage, indications, or contraindications arise.

Rx Aphthasol

Disp 5g

Sig Apply thin layer to ulcer 4-5 times a day.

Ingedient: Ameloxanox.

Note: Aphthasol indicated for aphthous ulcers only.

◆ ANGULAR CHEILITIS (CRACKING IN THE CORNER OF THE MOUTH)

Rx Mycolog II Cream

Disp I5 g

Sig Apply to corners of mouth 4 times per day

Ingredients: 100,000 units nystatin per gram, 1.0 mg. triamcinolone acetonide

7) MISCELLANEOUS

Dentin hypersensitivity treatment*
Tooth Whitening Products*
Anti caries Agents*
Antigingivitis/Antiplaque Agents*
Necrotizing Ulcerating Periodontitis
(HIV Periodontal Disease)
Saliva Problems
Sinus infection treatment
Pediatric dosages

*Note: Check <u>www.ada.org/public</u> for most current list of over-the-counter products that have the ADA Seal of Acceptance.

◆ DENTIN HYPERSENSITIVITY Suggested steps in resolving Dentin Hypersensitivity:

A thorough exam to rule out any other source for the problem such as tooth fracture, occiusal trauma, or irreversible pulpitis, must be done first. The most common reason for persistent hypersensitivity is bruxing.

Treatment Steps:

- Step I. Home treatment with a desensitizing toothpaste containing potassium nitrate (used to brush teeth at least 2 times a day, as well as a thin layer applied to affected teeth and left overnight, each night for 3-4 weeks). Tell patient not to use tartar control toothpaste. It may slow natural occlusion of dentinal tubules by preventing calcium precipitation.
- Step 2. If in office, potassium or ferric oxalate application (Sensodyne by Block Drug or Protect by Butler) or a fluoride varnish such as CavityShield, Duraphat or Duraflor.
- Step 3. If sensitivity still not tolerable to patient, consider pumice then seal teeth with dentin adhesive, i.e. **Amalgabond** or **All-bond**. If still sensitive, consider composite or composite/glass ionomer restoration.

Home Use Products (OTC)

Potassium nitrate is the active ingredient in all desensitizing toothpastes.

(Crest Sensitivity Protection, Promise, Sensodyne, Colgate Sensitive, Oragel Sensitive, etc.)

Other Home Use Products

Stannous fluoride formulations (less effective than potassium nitrate for dentin hypersensitivity) (Gel-Kam

Gel, Stop Gel, or any stannous fluoride gel. Some practitioners have gotten good results with RX Sodium Fluoride (5000ppm).

TOOTH WHITENING PRODUCTS

Most dental whitening products accepted by the ADA contain some type of peroxide, which oxidizes the stains. These accepted products must be prescribed/dispensed by a dentist. Crest White Stripes are an effective OTC, peroxide containing whitening product.

To date, several OTC toothpastes, **Crest Extra Whitening, Crest Multicare Whitening Toothpaste, Colgate Total Plus, etc.** have the ADA seal for whitening. The main mechanism is abrasive removal of stains.

♦ MANAGING DENTAL DECAY AS AN INFECTIOUS DISEASE

Fluorides to "harden" tooth structure

Of course, OTC toothpaste (1000-I500ppm) and, consider, OTC fluoride rinses (230pm)

High Caries Rate

Rx: Sodium Fluoride (5000 ppm) Gel or toothpaste

And consider

Fluoride Varnish (22,600 ppm) applied every 6 months

Compounds used to kill cariogenic bacteria

Chlorhexidine: For optimal control of patients with high decay rate **Chlorhexidine (0.12%) Oral Rinse**(page 51), 2x day, for 2 weeks, every 3 months.

lodine: (Be sure patient does not have iodine allergy.) Rinse I teaspoon of Betadine in mouth for I minute every 2 months. (It tastes awful, get over it!)

Xylitol: Xylitol is a natural sugar that cariogenic bacteria cannot metabolize into tooth dissolving acidic by-products. It's presence alters the oral bacterial environment and decreases the risk of decay.

<u>Dosage</u>: Chew 2 sticks of gum for 5 minutes, 3 times a day (discontinue use if TMJ symptoms occur) or suck on xylitol candy 3-4 times a day.

Disp 2.0 oz.

Sig Brush on teeth or place I teaspoon in fluoride tray and apply to teeth 3-5 minutes once a day.

Note: If caries severe, after brushing teeth, use neutral fluoride gel (5000ppm) in custom tray for 3-5 minutes, once per day, for as long as needed (years)

*Note: For rampant decay in children, <u>very small amounts</u> of stannous fluoride (I SOOppm) may be <u>dabbed on lesion</u> daily by parent to arrest decay until definitive treatment can be rendered. Prolonged use would increase risk of fluorosis.

◆ ADA ACCEPTED ANTIPLAQUE AND ANTI GINGIVITIS AGENTS

Rx ChlorhexidIne Oral Rinse 0.12%

Disp 3 x l6oz

Sig 1/2 oz swish for 30 seconds 2 times a day

Caution: Chlorhexidine may:

- Stain teeth yellow to brown
- Alter taste (temporary)
- Increase the deposition of calculus. (other than that, it is excellent)

Note: Peridex and PerioGard are still available, as well as a vast array of new generic products.

Note: Consider for patients with high decay rate

Rx Listerine (OTC)

Disp

Sig Rinse I tablespoon in mouth for 30 seconds, 2 times a day

Rx Colgate Total Toothpaste (OTC)

Disp

Sig Brush teeth with toothpaste 2-3 times a day

◆ MANAGEMENT OF NECROTIZING ULCERATING PERIODONTITIS (HIV PERIODONTAL DISEASE)

Initial Treatment (In-Office)

Betadine Rinse

(Insure patient has no iodine allergies)
Gentle debridement

At-home

Chiorhexidine rinse (page 51) Metronidazole (Flagyl) 7-10 days (page 29)

• Follow-up therapy

Proper dental cleaning including scaling and root planing (repeat as needed)
Continue **Chiorhexidine** rinse (indefinite)

◆ SALIVA PROBLEMS SALIVARY HYPOFUNCTION / XEROSTOMIA

Dry Mouth is most commonly caused by radiation (cancer treatment), immunologic (Sjogren's Syndrome) destruction of the salivary glands or by medications. Advanced age can also lead to decreased resting levels of saliva production, though stimulated flows may be normal.

Treatment: If salivary glands are still functional, they can be stimulated with pilocarpine or

Evoxac

Rx Salagen 5 mg

Disp 90 tablets

Sig Take I tablet 3-4 times per day (maximum dose 10 mg 3 times a day)

Ingredient: Pilocarpine Hydrochloride *Note*: Pilocarpine is available generic.

Rx Evoxac 30 mg

Disp 90 tablets

Sig Take I tablet 3 times per day

Ingredient. Cevimeline

Caution: Read prescribing information on both above drugs, many contra-indications

(i.e. glaucoma) and precautions (eye, heart, lung, etc, diseases)

Palliative Treatment of Dry Mouth:

Artificial Salivas: Saliva Substitute (Roxane)

MouthKote (Pasnell) Moi-stir (Kingswood)

Plain water in a small squirt bottle

Artificial Lubricant: Biotene Oral Balance Gel (Laclede) Non-Irritating Toothpaste: Biotene Toothpaste (Laclede)

Mouth Spray: Breathtech Plague Fighter Mouth Spray (Omnii Products)

Note: See, Managing Dental Decay, for those patients with severe Xerostomia

◆ SALIVARY HYPERFUNCTION (SIALOSCHESIS)

The following two drugs are used to block excessive salivary flow during restorative procedures

Note: These two drugs are contraindicated in glaucoma. Can dry eyes, so remove contact lens.

Rx Propantheline 15mg

Disp 1-2 tablets per appointment

Sig Take I tablet 1/2 hour before dental appointment

Ingredient: Propantheline

Note: in some patients, 2 tablets may be needed.

Rx Sal-Tropine 0.4 mg

Disp I tablet per appointment

Sig Take I tablet I hour before dental appointment on empty stomac

Ingredient: Atropine

♦ SINUS INFECTION TREATMENT

DDS may elect to treat sinuses, but only to rule out dental problems, otherwise, refer to physician.

Rx Amoxicillin 500 mg

Disp 21 tablet

Sig Take I tablet three times a day

OR

Rx Augmentin 500 mg

Disp 30

Sig Take I tablet 3 times a day

Ingredients: Amoxicillin, Clavulanate Potassium

 The selected Antibiotic (above) should be used with the compounds below to block the histamine effect (Allegra) and to shrink the sinuses (Neo-Synephrine)

Rx Allegra 30 mg (OTC) *

Disp 14 tablets

Sig Take I tablet two times a day

Rx Neo-Synephrine (OTC)

Disp 15 ml

Sig 2 sprays in each nostril, not more often than every 4 hours

◆ DRY SOCKET (ACUTE OSTEITIS, ALVEOLAR OSTEITIS)

This is a necrosis of bone following a dental extraction. It is <u>not</u> an infection and usually not associated with an infection.

Treatment is designed to soothe the pain while the area heals.

- I. Gently irrigate socket with saline.
- 2. Gently place 1/4 inch gauze strip soaked in 20% Eugenol into socket.

(D.S. Dressing, Canfield, Inc. 1-800-446-2444)

- 3. Leave for 48 hours.
- 4. Repeat if severe pain persists. May require 3 or 4 packings.

Note: Prescribe pain medication as needed.

Note: If obvious pus/infection, then it is not a dry socket, it is an infection and you must manage as an infection and prescribe antibiotics.

PEDIATRIC DOSAGES

Pediatric dosages are given as mg of drug per kg (I kg = 2.2 lbs) of child per 24 hours. The average child is considered an adult by age 12-14 depending on weight. **The child dose should never exceed the adult dose**, even if the calculation suggests it does.

The table below lists the maximum dose in mg/kg (I kg 2.2 lbs for a child in a 24 hour period. It also indicates the frequency of dosing. Please note the maximum 24 hour dose must be divided by the suggested number of doses per 24 hours, to get the amount for each dose.

If there are any concerns or questions as to appropriateness of dosage, drug interactions or indications for the drug, consult the child's physician, a pharmacist or the drug's package insert information.

Note: In California (and possibly other states, check your state law), to give oral sedation to a child under 13 years old requires a special oral sedation permit from the State Board of Dental Examiners. Oral sedation means anything given by mouth that will sedate or relax the child. This would include sedative/hypnotics (barbiturates, benzodiazepines), antihistamines, narcotics and chloral hydrate.

Acetaminophen 12-16 mg/kg, 4x day

max. dose, 50-65 mg/kg/24hr

Acetaminophen 125 mg 3-7 y/o I teaspoon (5 ml) every 6 hrs 8-12 y/o 2 teaspoons (10 ml) every 6 hrs + Codeine 12mg / 5 ml

Acyclovir >2Y/0 same as adult Amoxicillin 8-33 mg/kg, 3x day

max. dose, 25-IOU mg/kg/24hr

Cephalexin 20-25 mg/kg, 4x day

max. dose, 75-100 mg/kg/24hr

Clindamycin 3-8 mg/kg, 3x day

max. dose, 10-25 mg/kg/24hr

Clotrimazole >2Y/0, same as adult.

Spit out saliva if stomach upset

Dicloxicillin 6-25 mg/kg, 4x day

max. dose, 25-IOU mg/kg/24 h r

>3Y/0, 3-6 mg/kg/24hr Diflucan Erythromycin

5-12 mg/kg, 4x day

max. dose, 20-50 mg/kg/24hr **Ibuprofen** 10 mg/kg, 4x day

> max. dose, 40 mg/kg/24hr > 2Y/0, same as adult

Ketoconazole Mycelex >2Y/0, same as adult spit out saliva if stomach upset

12-18 mg/kg, 3x day

Metronidazole

max. dose, 35-50 mg/kg/24h

Naproxen Sodium 5 mg/kg, 2x day

max. dose, 10 mg/kg/24 hr

Valium 0.04-0.25 mg/kg, 3x day

max. dose, 0.12-0.8 mg/kg/24hr

PROPHYLATIC ANTIBIOTIC COVERAGE FOR THE PREVENTION OF BACTERIAL ENDOCARDITIS

Current American Heart Association Guidelines

Published June II, 1997, JAMA Vol 277, pp 1794-1801

Premedication requirements for patients with valvular heart disease or congenital cardiac defects. If in doubt, have patient consult their physician as to need.

Dental procedures for which endocarditis prophylaxis is recommended

- Dental extractions
- Periodontal procedures including surgery, scaling, and root planing, probing, and recall
- Endodontic (root canal) instrumentation or surgery only beyond the apex
- Subgingival placement of antibiotic fibers or strips
- Initial placement of orthodontic bands but not brackets
- Intraligamentary local anesthetic injections
- Prophylactic cleaning of teeth or implants where bleeding is anticipated

(Prophylaxis is recommended for patients with high- and moderate-risk cardiac conditions)

Standard Regimen

Rx Amoxicillin 500 mg

Disp 4 tablet

Sig Take 4 tablets (2.0 g) I hour before procedure.

Note: I) Children 50mg/kg. Do not exceed adult dose

2) No second dose is required for adults or children

• STANDARD REGIMEN FOR PATIENTS <u>ALLERGIC</u> TO AMOXICILLIN/PENICILLIN

Rx Clindamycin I5O mg

Disp 4 tablet

Sig Take 4 tablets (600 mg), I hour before procedure.

OR

Rx Cephalexin 500 mg

Disp 4 tablets

Sig Take 4 tablets (2 g) I hour before procedure.

OR

Rx Cefadroxil 500 mg

Disp 4 tablets

Sig Take 4 tablets (2 g), I hour before procedure.

Note: Cephalosporins should not be used in individuals with immediate-type hypersensitivity reaction (urticaria, angioedema, or anaphylaxis) to penicillins.

OR

Rx Azithromycin 250 mg

Disp 2 tablets

Sig Take tablets (500 mg), I hour before procedure.

OR

Rx Clarithromycin 250 mg

Disp 2 tablets

Sig Take tablets (500 mg), I hour before procedure.

Note: Children's dosage. (Do not exceed adult dose)

Clindamycin 20 mg/kg Cephalexin 50 mg/kg Cepadroxil 50 mg/kg Azithromycin 15 mg/kg Clarithromycin 15 mg/kg

• PATIENTS UNABLE TO TAKE ORAL MEDICATION

Ampicillin 2 g IV or IM within 30 minutes before procedure.

Children: 50 mg/kg IV or IM within 30 minutes before procedure

• FOR PATIENTS UNABLE TO TAKE ORAL MEDICATION AND ALLERGIC TO AMPICILLIN, AMOXICILLIN, PENICILLIN

Clindamycin 600 mg IV within 30 minutes before procedure.

Children: 20mg/kg IV within 30 minutes before procedure.

Cefazolin 1 g IV or IM within 30 minutes before procedure.

Children: 25 mg/kg IV or IM within 30 minutes before operation.

Note: Cephalosporins should not be used in individuals with immediate-type

hypersensitivity reaction (uticaria, angioedema, or anaphylaxis) to

penicillin.

Sig Take 4 tablets (600 mg), I hour before procedure.

IF PATIENT UNABLE TO TAKE ORAL MEDICATION

<u>Cefazolin</u> I g or Ampicillin 2 g IM or IV, I hour prior to procedure

IF PATIENT ALLERGIC TO PENICILLIN AND UNABLE TO TAKE ORAL MEDICATIONS

Clindamycin 600 mg IV, I hour prior to procedure
